Catholic Charities Reorganizing

The National Conference of Catholic Charities has called for a major overhaul of its programs. That was the topic at a recent meeting of representatives of Catholic Charities from dioceses in New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, and Washington, D.C.

Representatives at the meeting at Malvern, Pa., discussed NCCC's proposals for extensive changes, including renewal of goals and structures, increased commitment, stronger organiza- the philosophy of charity which tion and greater membership participation.

A two-year study released by Courier-Journal

the NCCC defines renewal as a continuing process, and a necessary consideration for Catholic Charities in the future. The study speaks of an orderly type of social action which involves members and reaches for their views on social problems and their possible solutions.

Father Joseph D'Aurizio, diocesan director of Catholic Charities, attended the meeting and is optimistic about the new outlook of the NCCC.

"There is a restructuring of we still use as a starting point. he said. "As a part of this philosophy, we must realize that although we are supposed to spread the good news of Christ, we are a part of the scandal of human suffering and injustice.'

Father D'Aurizio continued, "Instead of being a bountiful lady who merely gives and gives, Catholic Charities must share in the responsibility of the problems which face us."

Concerning local reorganization of Catholic Charities, Father D'Aurizio said that the new system will give "representation across the board. Whether our people work with the Ladies of Charity, the settlement houses, or the inner city office, they will have the opportunity to study our new philosophy and either accept or reject it.

125 Receive Degree

The class, named in honor of Bishop Joseph L. Hogan, received the degree in Our Lady of Lourdes parish hall.
