

Discuss Loop Project

Downtown Pastors, UDC

A representative of the Urban Development Corporation told the Southeast Ecumenical Ministry that the planners for the Southeast Loop community are physical planners and need help with the social planning if the community is to be a success.

Richard Pine of UDC-Greater Rochester, Inc. told nine denominational representatives who met April 18 at Third Presbyterian Church, where construc-tion of the project stands. There will be no church structures.

Pine drew a heartfelt "Amen" from the Rev. Donald Gratiot, dean of Christ Church Cathedral, when he said, "We have lots of downtown churches that aren't what they used to be since people left the city for the suburbs. We will provide people that will begin to go back to the existing downtown churches, that I know are now fighting for their lives."

The Rev. E. J. Schlossmacher, pastor of Bethel Full Gospel Church, told the group that his church had spent \$80,000 in anticipation of the new community. "I have a spiritual responsibility to this new community," he said.

None of the Catholic pastors who are members of the Southeast Ecumenical Ministry attended the meeting.

Father Henry Atwell, director of the Genesee Ecumenical Ministry, which is also involved in planning religion into two other new communities, Gonanda and Riverton, said he prefers a central office or multi-purpose facility within the community. The facility would be for use by all denominations.

The Rev. Robert Gillespie of Third Presbyterian Church pointed out that the public school proposed for the center of the community would be the perfect facility, when school is not in sessíon.

The group agreed on the importance of having religion in evidence to greet the first arrivals in December, 1972.


Father Atwell suggested that the first residents should be consulted on the development of a religious program.

"The buildings will be going up in stages," Father Atwell explained, "so the religious program can grow. We aren't committing ourselves totally at the outset."
