Group Hits Viet Air War

A group of area clergy, religious and laity recently sent f President Richard Nixon a letter t expressing deep disturbance over the recent escalation of the war in Indochina.

The letter carried 39 signatures of Catholics, Protestants, and Jews. They were all identified as having religious affiliations.

"While we do not condone the violence for which the North Vietnamese are responsible, we emphatically object to the escalation of the air war by the United States," the letter said.

The group charged, "evidence clearly shows that the U. S. is guilty of the initial escalation," citing the invasion of Cambodia, computerization of the air war and the initial incursion into South Vietnam "in defiance of the Geneva Agreements."

The group called on the people of Rochester to join in protest to the air war and the bombing of North Vietnam.
