School Money Plan Discarded

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The council voted to approve the guidelines.

Father Joseph Brennan then raised the question: "Are we absolved from the interim plans or should we reconsider our decision in the light of this morning's meeting?"

Msgr. George Cocuzzi, pastor of Holy Family, and chairman of the council, asked how many had second thoughts on the plans after the morning's session. Most admitted they had.

Msgr. Cocuzzi said, "I feel that if set back on their own

resources most parishes will come up with scratch to get by for a year, and I think the plan would just create a lot of ill will."

Father James Moynihan, Chancellor, who came out last month against the plans, saying additional taxes would force many parishes into bankruptcy, agreed.

Father Brennan moved they revoke their endorsement of the Interim Financial Plan but reaffirm the increased subsidy for innercity schools. The vote was 11 for and two opposed.

Stella Maris Plans Mapped

Father Joseph F. D'Aurizio, the new diocesan director of Catholic Charities, will be the executive director of Camp Stella Maris, a residential camp on Conesus Lake operated by the diocese.

Father D'Aurizio sees the camp as a "tremendous opportunity for the child to experience Christian living with peers. He, or she, will be able to share experiences with children of different cultural backgrounds, to participate in programs together and to share in the Liturgy."

Pointing out that he and his staff already are working on some innovative concepts for this year's camp, Father D'Aurizio said "we are ready to accept reservations from all boys and girls, ages 7 to 14, regardless of faith."

The boys' season covers a six-week period from June 25 to Aug. 25, the girls' from Aug. 6 to 26.

Programs include sports, crafts, outdoor life, special events, and waterfront activities. Every precaution is taken to insure the safety of campers, including a staff of experienced counselors as well as Red Cross-trained life guards.

Father D'Aurizio previously served five years as Catholic Charities' director in Elmira and the Southern Tier. He was ordained in 1956. For five years, he served as assistant pastor at Corpus Christi Church in Rochester. It was at this time that the native Rochesterian became affiliated with Catholic Charities. He pursued graduate studies at the University of Boston College, whence he obtained a Master's Degree in Social Work in 1964.

Four New Members Join Area Arts Council

Four Monroe County cultural organizations have been voted into membership in the Arts Council of Rochester. This brings total Arts Council membership to 46 cultural organizations.

The Concert Chorale of the Sisters of St. Joseph: the Chorale, which has been active for seven years, was established to bring both sacred and secular concerts of fine music literature to the general public and to provide singers an opportunity to sing in a chorus. In the past year, the chorale has performed in Auburn, Oswego, Elmira College, Geneva, Ithaca College, and Rochester in spring and fall concerts.

The Monroe County School Music Association: the association was established 16 years ago to advance the cause of music education through mutual helpfulness and promotion of a wide variety of musical projects and activities.

The Storyteller's Summer Playhouse: The Playhouse was established eight years ago to further the development of chil-

dren's theater by producing good plays both for and with children through two annual summer workshops culminating in the production of two plays. Last summer's productions were "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" and "Hansel and Gretel." This summer they will be producing "Rumpelstiltskin" and "The Emperor's New Clothes."

Joining the Arts Council as a provisional member is Hospital Audiences, Inc. Established three years ago, it was designed to promote the cultural enrichment of individuals in city, state, county, and federal hospitals; correctional facilities; addiction and alcoholism treatment centers; outpatient programs; children's homes; agencies for the physically handicapped and centers for the aged through Rochester's five-county area. Since September, HAI-Rochester has arranged for 750 patients to attend theater, music, dance, film, lecture, and sports events and has brought cultural programs and workshops to an additional 1000 or more persons who are confined to their institutions.
