## 'Spirit' Important At St. Mary's School

Waterloo - "The introduction of the concept of departmentalization at the fifth through the eighth grade level has been the biggest program change," indicated Sister Mary Cumbo, teacher principal at St. Mary's, as she reviewed changes inaugurated this year. She nears completion of her first year as principal.

"This emphasis involved a shift from the self-contained classroom to utilization of teachers with specialization in a particular subject area at more than one grade level. In addition to sharing special background with more students, it permits variety for the student as well as the teacher '

Sister expressed much satisfaction with the new Ginn 360 reading program introduced last year and which will be expanded into the fourth grade in the Fall. This series encourages individualized instruction, allowing the child to move along in reading at his own pace. Experiences this year indicate the children are more enthusiastic about reading and the books have provided excellent enrichment stories.

For the second year, St. Mary's students have been enrolled as

members of the Central New York Education Council. Each classroom has access to educational T.V. and with this membership, each teacher receives a detailed manual, plan and follow up for each program. Sister explained it has worked out well in grades one through five, especially in phonics, English, reading, science and social studies. It has opened up the classroom and has stimulated creative follow up study.

St. Mary's has a full-time gym program supplemented by voluntéers. A library was set up last year, staffed by volunteers, and is being further developed.

Religious instruction is given by the classroom teacher, with priests participating in special celebrations and liturgy.

St. Mary's has the services of a school psychologist, and part-

time learning disability and remedial reading teacher.

Sister would like to encourage volunteer participation for in-dividualized instruction in the future.

Sister feels the spirit, community atmosphere and closeness of faculty and students are an outstanding aspect of St. Mary's school. The dedication, interest, and concern of the teachers, as a faculty in relation to the students, contribute to the family atmosphere that exists in the school.
