

Filippini Religions Slate Tercentenary

Watkins Glen — The Religious Teachers Filippini at St. Mary's of the Lake Church will host the 300th birthday anniversary celebration of Saint Lucy Filippini on Sunday beginning at 7:30 a.m.

Saint Lucy was the founder of the order teaching at the parish.

A special Mass celebrated by Father Lawrence W. Sansom will be offered at 7:30 a.m. to honor St. Lucy, and an evening program with a tercentenary dinner will begin at 6 p.m. in the church center.

Guests at the dinner will include priests who served at St. Mary of the Lake and priests and Sisters from Watkins Glen. Mother Mary Palancé, provincial superior of the order, will also be

present at the birthday celebration.

The Religious Teachers Filippini took up residence in the parish in 1936.

St. Lucy Filippini was declared a saint by Pope Pius XI in 1930. Her life was dedicated to the apostolate of Christian formation of both youth and the adults of the City of Rome and the surrounding area.

At her death, St. Lucy had established 52 schools and mission

centers throughout Italy. Currently the congregation has provinces in the U.S., South America, England and Saudi Arabia.

The American province is headquartered in Morristown, N.J.

Corning Parish Counts Ballots

Corning — Eight parishioners of St. Patrick's Church were elected to the Parish Council in balloting May 6 and 7. Also elected were a lay member and a lay alternate member from St. Patrick's to the Corning Area Catholic School Board of Education. The election was determined by the votes of 298 parishioners.

John P. Riesbeck, reelected, and Frederick M. Roe, newly elected are members at large for two-year terms on the Council. Mrs. John J. Clark, incumbent, and Robert G. O'Dell were elected for two-year terms and Mrs. Sidney J. Manning was elected for a one-year term, all as representatives of the city area of the parish.

Incumbent Ralph A. Simon won a two-year post as adult Council member representing the South Corning and Town of Caton area. Representing the East Corning and Gibson area of the parish for a two-year term is John K. Winkler.

Brian Lovell was elected youth member at large, for a two-year term.

The new lay members will be installed June 4. They will join Father Emmett Davis, pastor, Father Eugene P. Sweeney, assistant pastor, Sister Robert Mary, SSJ and seven other lay Council members, whose terms expire in June 1973. At the June meeting, new Council officers will be elected.

In the contest for parish representatives to the Corning Area Catholic School Board, Mrs. Donald J. Lartigue was elected for a two-year term and Joseph A. Carapella was elected alternate member for a one-year term. They will be installed at the June meeting of the board. They will join Father Davis and Dr. Joseph Panzarino as representatives of St. Patrick's on the board for the 1972-73 school year. The board will meet on June 4 at 7:30 p.m. at St. Mary's and St. John's.

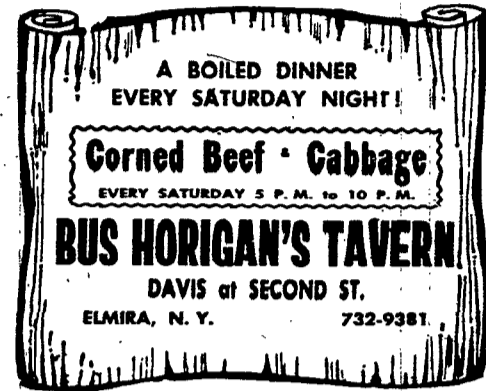

A charge of \$1.50 per adult and \$1.00 for children will be made. Pre-school children will be



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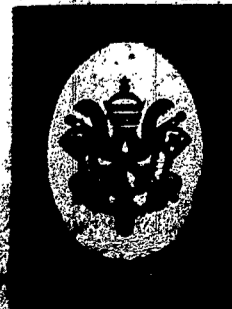
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
