Get out the frozen waffles and it's "just toast, please." Get smart and wait until everybody is at the table. The first grader wants last night's baked potatoes diced and fried. The nursery school boy orders strawberries (don't wash them, you'll ruin 'em) and just one dill pickle. The two-yearold who weighs 23 pounds dripping wet asks for scrambled eggs, pancakes and Cheerios with a side order of toast and grape jelly.
