EVERYBODY wanted porridge the morning before. On this morning NOBODY wants porridge. I plan "state fair eggs." The vote is for Rice Krispies. Get out the frozen waffles and it's "just toast, please." Get smart and wait until everybody is at the table. The first grader wants last night's baked potatoes diced and fried. The nursery school boy orders strawberries (don't wash them, you'll ruin 'em) and just one dill pickle. The two-year-old who weighs 23 pounds dripping wet asks for scrambled eggs, pancakes and Cheerios with a side order of toast and grape jelly. Their father who is having juice and coffee remarks that democracy in the kitchen is a rotten idea. We are in agreement.

**Sacred Heart Sisters
Return for Seminar**

More than 25 nuns connected with the old Academy of the Sacred Heart will be guests of local alumnae and friends during a seminar scheduled for the week of June 18.

The visitors, members of the Religious of the Sacred Heart, are former teachers or graduates of the school their order maintained for more than 100 years on Prince Street.

The seminar, on Crisis in Belief, will be conducted by Sacred Heart Sisters and guest speakers, June 18-22 at McQuaid. Current moral and religious issues will be examined at seven morning and evening sessions.

At the Sunday afternoon opening, Sister Elizabeth Cavanagh, RSCJ, of St. Louis, provincial of the Southern Vicariate, will discuss Sacred Heart Education — its heritage and its future.

The international teaching order staffs 24 academies and six colleges in the United States, including Manhattenville, which has 12 students from the Rochester area and Newton, which has 17. The order served in Rochester continuously from 1855 until the Prince Street school closed in 1969.

Sister Carolyn Osiek, RSCJ, a doctoral candidate at Harvard in the field of New Testament and Christian Origins, will conduct a group dialogue on Scripture. A multi-media presentation on Conscience and Confession will be given by Sister Joan Magnetti, RSCJ. She also will devote a day to "Growing in Christ." The morning session will focus on the elementary pupil, the evening session, on the teenager.

Sister Mary Ann Burke, RSCJ, a masters candidate at Boston Theological Institute, will direct a discussion of contemporary theologians.

Guest speakers include Father Albert P. Bartlett, SJ, and the Rev. Arthur R. McKay, president of Colgate Rochester. A panel with concerned teenagers will be led by William A. Guifre, a CCD co-ordinator and Brighton guidance counselor.
