Mental Health Commentary

Q—My oldest child always picks on his younger sister, the second child. If he doesn't have a good reason, he makes one up. He is well behaved otherwise and gets along well with the youngest child. Any suggestions?

A—Sibling rivalry of some degree is said to be universal. Half the time, the first child dislikes the second, but likes the third. The second child dislikes the third child, but likes the fourth, etc.

A simple explanation is that the oldest child, having had the parents to himself, with a new brother or sister, finds himself faced with a rival who absorbs, necessarily, his mother's time and attention, previously reserved for him. He resents it, of course, and blames, not the mother he loves, but the intruder who causes his jealousy.

It is difficult to prepare an infant under two for a forthcoming brother or sister and the usual, short separation from his mother before she returns with the new addition to the family. It is worth the effort but don't depend upon a full understanding of the event.

When mother returns, it is better that she reunite with the older child, especially if he was upset by the separation. Then she can introduce the baby. If the baby is introduced to the older child as his baby, don't be surprised if he expects to have it as he might a toy. The misimpression is usually quickly corrected — sometimes to the older child's wonderment. In general, focus less on the new baby at first, and more on the ex-baby; he is the one who needs reassurance that he still has an important place in his mother's heart.

The rivalries later in life may be based in large part on this competition for mother's love. When it becomes persistently hostile, with provocation of fights, incessant teasing, etc., the "rival" is being used as a scapegoat on whom to vent anger due to other causes. Then it is not enough to consider the natural reaction to displacement from the "baby of the family" role. Look for scapegoating.
