

Clergy Changes Announced by Diocese

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan today named new pastors for seven parishes.

He announced the retirement of four pastors and the temporary release of a fifth on sick leave, and also listed seven special assignments.

The pastorates affected are in Elmira and in Livingston, Steuben and Cayuga counties, and Monroe County, outside Rochester.

Msgr. John F. Duffy, pastor of St. Mary's, Dansville, for the past three years, goes to Addison, trading places with Father Richard C. O'Connell, who has been pastor of St. Catherine's for nearly the same period.

Msgr. Duffy directed the diocesan office of the Propagation of the Faith Society for the eight years preceding his first pastorate. He is a native of Rochester and has been a priest since 1946.

Father O'Connell, from Clifton Springs, was ordained in 1951 and was an assistant at St. Agnes, Avon, when he was appointed to St. Catherine's.

Father Egan, an Auburn man, moves up from St. Joan the Evangelist, Clyde, where he has been associate pastor since 1967. He was with the Army Air Force in the Pacific area for 40 months of World War II, and was ordained to the priesthood in 1954.

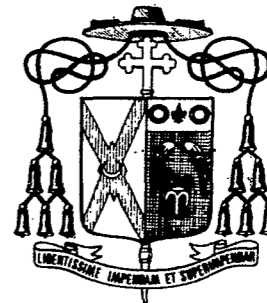

Four Priests Retire

The Pastoral Office announced today the retirement of four pastors and the resignation, for health reasons, of a fifth.

Retired are Fathers Roy F. Hagerty, John L. Maxwell, and George Vogt, and Msgr. Philip McGhan. Father Daniel V. Hogan is on three months' leave from pastoral duties at St. Bernard's, Scipio Center; St. Hilary, Genoa, and St. Isaac Jogues, Fleming.

Father Hagerty, a Rochesterian ordained in 1927, had been pastor since 1953 of St. Joseph's Livonia; St. William, Conesus, and St. Margaret's Chapel, Conesus Lake. Earlier, he served

nearly 20 years as an assistant at St. Ambrose.

Father Maxwell, a wartime chaplain in the Navy, retired from the pastorate of St. Vincent de Paul, Churchville, which he had held since 1957. Father Maxwell was first resident pastor of St. Leo's, Hilton, and then pastor of St. Gregory, Marion. He is a native of Macedon and was ordained in 1928.

Father Vogt, named pastor of Good Shepherd, Henrietta, in 1946, also served St. Joseph's, Rush, from there for several years. A member of St. Bernard's class of 1927, he took an M.A. degree at St. Bonaventure and

taught at St. Andrew's Seminary from 1930 until 1939. For the next seven years, he was diocesan director of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine. He was brought up in Holy Redeemer parish.

Msgr. McGhan retired because of illness from the pastorate of Ss. Peter and Paul, Elmira. He is a patient at St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, where he was chaplain and a teacher for the 28 years preceding his appointment as pastor. He is a native of Romulus and was ordained in 1937.

Priests Council, Principals Hold Meetings

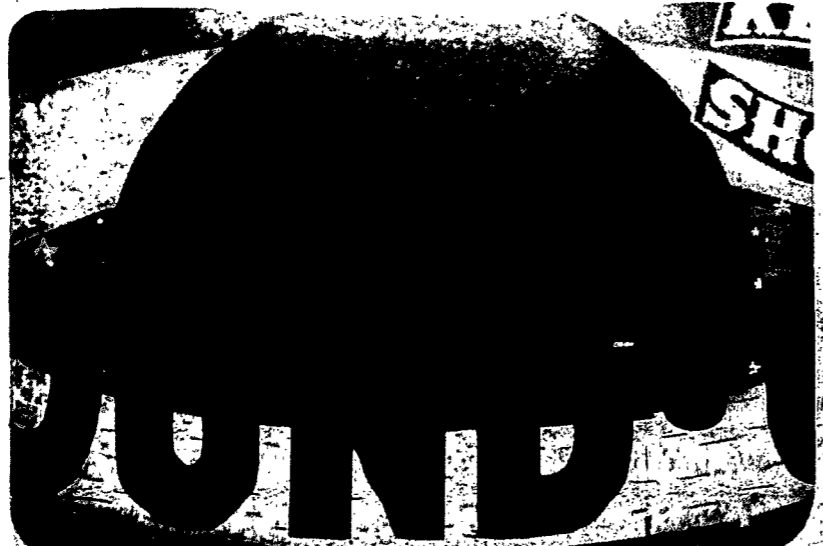
Biggest news of the week are the clergy changes announced on Page 2. But there were plenty of other happenings also.
