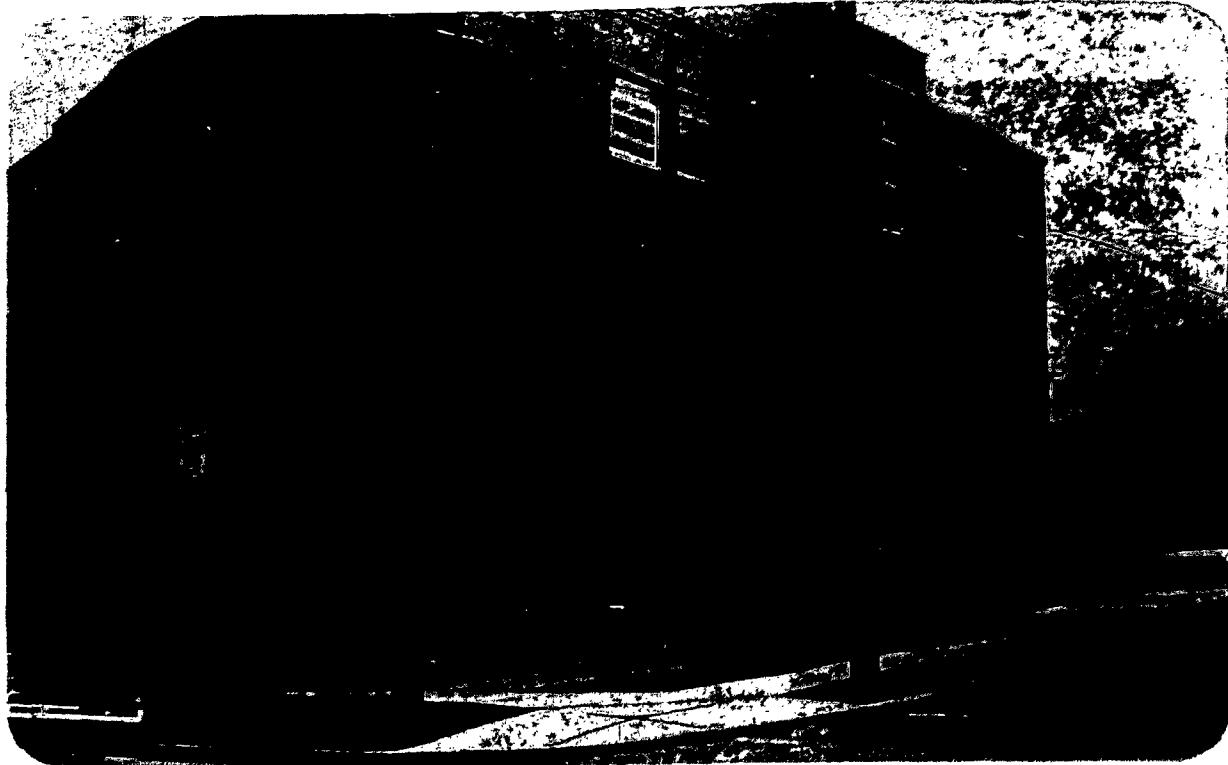

Legislators Accept 'Registration on Demand'

The Monroe County Legislature voted last Tuesday to authorize extension of the mobile registration program into a "registration on demand" program to be operated by 350 volunteers.

Under the new law, homes for the elderly, factories, apartment houses and shopping centers can be voter registration sites.

Last March the legislature accepted the resolution submitted by student and citizen groups to offer voter registration at area high schools and colleges.

Because of the success of that program, the response of the public and the capable work of the volunteers, the resolution extending that program was a "shoo in," according to Father Charles Mulligan, director of the Office of the Human Development and president of the Voter Coalition, the group responsible for the resolution.

The Voter Coalition is made up of a variety of bi-partisan groups: Senior Citizens Action Council, Junior Chamber of Commerce, Rochester Coalition for the Student Vote, AFL-CIO Labor Council, Office of Human Development, Church Women United, League of Women Voters and the Women's Political Caucus.

When Monroe County was essentially the city of Rochester, the central office for registra-

tion was sufficient," a spokesman for the coalition explained, "but now Monroe County is 700 square miles. The population has grown 17% since 1960 and registration is down 1%."

In New York state one must vote at least every two years to maintain registration, the result being that a major voter registration campaign must be waged every presidential election year, the coalition maintains. Criticism was leveled against state legislators for not publicizing changes in requirements. Most recently, the law barring those with criminal records has been changed, allowing them to register and vote when they are no longer on probation.

Registration started Saturday, July 15 at these new sites: Greece Town Mall, Midtown, Plaza and Bulls Head near Brown St.

A volunteer registrar must have registered in one of the two major parties before last November and be able to give 24 hours to the work. Anyone interested may contact the Office of Human Development, 328-6400, or Susan Dollinger at 544-3124.
