Mental Health Commentary

Q - My husband and I disagree about the effect of watching violence on children. I think it makes them more inclined to fight and hurt each other. My husband disagrees. Am I not right?

A — The effect of violence on television is a controversial subject among professionals as well as parents. It is easier to add heat FREDDY BECK Orchestra, finest in music rather than light to the subject. Certainly children are exposed to violence in entertainment as well as news reporting in many media. The amount of this kind of exposure has increased significantly since World War II with the emergence of television as a household fixture and the continuing military activity abroad and civic disobedi ence at home. Man seems to have an attraction to violence in his fantasy and actual experience. Throughout recorded history, it has permeated the stage and literature. From the arenas in Ancient Rome to the boxing ring of more modern times, he has been an eager observer not just as a child, but also as an adult. Violence as a political influencer is being widely practiced today and has motivated much research on the subject including the effect of this type of television programming. Some researchers conclude it is bad for children,

The tube brings violence scenes into our homes for both children. and adult. One can ask what effect it has on parents as well as the effect on children. It can stir sympathy for the victim as well as identification with the aggressor. It can activate latent aggressive feelings which may result in aggressive behavior and affect dream content. The effect of it will depend on the personality of the observer. Remember, a reaction to a stimulus depends on the nature of the stimulus, and, on the nature of the person reacting to it.

Watching violence on television or in the movies can be exciting and pleasurable. It can be a way of releasing pent up aggression, not an uncommon phenomenon. Such sublimation has some merit though the traditional playing it out in chase games and sports is a more realistic and total experience - physically and mentally. This outlet has more to recommend it than the physically passive, emotionally intense exposure to violent scenes on a tube.

Television violence is artificial, is experienced in the safety of the home and can be avoided by leaving the room so the observer has some control of his exposure to it. He also may become so used to it that he underreacts to violence when it really occurs. This phenomonon has been used to explain why many people may witness a violent attack without making an attempt to help the victim.

School Aid Case Headed To High Court

New York — The three-Judge Federal Court hearing the request for final payment of the 1971-1972 mandated services funds to nonpublic schools said "no" in a split decision.

Previously the judges had issued an order against final payment of the second half funds which were due prior to June 15th. The appeal asked them to reverse their order. They refused by a 2-1 decision.

Attorneys for the schools will now seek a reversal of their stop on the funds from a Supreme Court judge. Since the Court is in recess, it is expected that one judge will hear the appeal.

The appeal will be made by the attorney general, the attorneys for the intervenor schools, and the attorneys for Sen. Brydges who is representing the Senate majority as in intervenor de-

The argument to the Supreme Court will be the same one presented to the lower court: based on payment due for services rendered. The payments have been expected (and budgeted by the schools) for 1971-1972, now over. Services were performed as contracted for by the State.

Once the appeal is filed a decision could come at any time.
