St. Vincent's School Loses to Flood

Corning — St. Vincent De Paul's School here is another victim of tropical storm Agnes. It will not reopen in September.

The damage suffered by St. Vincent's church, school, rectory and convent is estimated at \$300,000 and 90% of the parish was hard hit by the flood.

Announcing the decision to the parish, Father Joseph F. Hogan, pastor, said "Floodravaged parochial schools will receive no federal or state aid, as far as we can determine, and the members of the parish who sustained such large personal loss cannot afford to do it on their own at this time.

"So because of tremendous loss not only to the parish but members of the parish, Corning Catholic School North will not open in September," he said.

The school closing affects 200 elementary pupils, seven lay teachers and two Sisters of Mercy.

The decision to close the school was made by parish auditors, trustees, school board and Sister Mary Krokow, coordinating principal of Corning Catholic School North and South after hearing the damage estimates from Father Hogan.

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Corning South to Reopen

Corning Catholic School South will open as scheduled in September, it was decided by the Corning Catholic School Board last Friday night.

Father Thomas F. Brennan, pastor of St. Mary's, where the school is located, explained that "Catholic School South will (Continued on Page 2)

Troops Seek Terrorists

18 Killed in Belfast

Belfast — Speculation as to the Irish Republican Army's motives grew here last week when a series of bomb blasts rocked this capital city of Northern Ireland during the busy Friday shopping

In just one hour of planned explosions 11 persons were killed and 130 injured, throwing the city into panic.

One guess as to the IRA motives was that the underground organization was attempting to provoke the occupying British troops into a new offensive in the Catholic areas, thus solidifying not always strong support for the IRA.

Though the IRA aim was unclear, the British army has opened a new offensive against the IRA.

William Whitelaw, the British administrator for Northern Ireland, told the sodiers, "Go after the killers, the bombmakers and the fanatics who mastermind them."

Even before he spoke, the troops had rounded up 76 suspects in the aftermath of the Friday bombings.

The complete toll in the bombing incidents rose to 18 when seven more persons were killed in ensuing gun battles. The total fatality count since the turmoil boiled over three years ago has risen to 461, including 102 British soldiers.

As to British plans to put down the latest flareup, one source said it would beef up its 17,000-man force in Northern Ireland and would step up recruiting for the 8,000-man Ulster Defense Regiment.
