**Mental Health Commentary**

One of the most fascinating autobiographies of an underprivileged person was published in 1941 in a book called "Born That Way" by Earl Carlson, who was born with a type of cerebral palsy called "athetosis". Like all types of cerebral palsy, there is a brain problem which affects the use of muscles. In athetosis, the problem is in coordination of movements: the speech flow is irregular, writing and self feeding is difficult and their walk may remind one of a drunken sailor. Tension may make the symptoms worse. Development is much slower than usual.

Carlson's story is a dramatic demonstration of making the most of one's assets and not dwelling on one's handicaps

Despite his handicap, his mother considered him one of the family and he was expected to act accordingly. Taking an apple from a fruit stand — one of his first attempts at meaningful hand use — was disapproved of by his mother who considered it stealing. Nor was she pleased when he finally began to creep because he crept into a neighbor's garden where he did not belong.

Carlson worked his way through the University of Minnesota, went on to Princeton University for a Master's degree and, finally, to the Yale University Medical School where he obtained a Doctorate in Medicine. He went on to success as a specialist in neurology with a special interest in cerebral palsy. He and his wife, a nurse, started their own treatment program for children with this handicap.

Behind his success was his mother's influence. She did not dwell on his handicap, explaining only that he was "born that way". She expected good performance and tenaciously believed in his future. He learned this lesson of faith and hope well.

Carlson's book has a lesson for our handicapped young people and their families. Do not dwell on your handicap! Make the most of your potential to mature!

The lesson is even more challenging to those young people who were blessed with healthy bodies and minds, yet lose their faith in their futures.

For parents, the lesson is to believe in them so, one day, they may learn to believe in themselves.

**F. A. O'Brien**

Celebrant of the Mass was Mr. O'Brien's godson, Father Thomas C. Kelly, OP. Concelebrating with Father Kelly were Msgr. Maynard Connell, Father Albert Shamon, Father Benedict L. Ehmann and Father Francis Pegnam.

Mr. O'Brien died at his home on July 6, after a long illness. He is survived by his wife, Rosemary, six sons: K. Gerard, Daniel F., Michael T., David G., Kevin P. and Patrick E.; three daughters: Sister Joan Marie, RSM, Martina M. and M. Brigid, also six grandchildren.

Mr. O'Brien was graduated from Rochester Catholic High School in 1920, where he played on the 1918 championship basketball team. He then attended St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries until 1926, at which time he attended Fordham and received his law degree from there in 1929. He became associated with the Rochester law firm of Raines & Raines and later with the firm of McFarlane Harris. He was a professor of law from 1933 to 1943 at Niagara University. Mr. O'Brien is a past president of the Torch Club.
