'Clean-Up' Holds Picnic

Auburn — Slides of the destruction and the work of "Operation Clean-Up" were shown by Father Lewis Brown, a member of the coordinating team, at recent picnic-reunion at Emerson Park, attended by more than 300 area volunteers and residents from the Corning area flood zone.

Volunteers were presented with a congratulatory letter from Auburn Mayor Paul Lattimore and a copy of two cartoons by Martin Stanton which appeared in the Citizen Advertiser. Corning City Manager Bruce Clifford

offered his congratulations on behalf of the mayor.

The day was marked with the same spirit of enthusiasm and unity which resulted in a total of more than 1400 volunteers working 23 days to aid flood victims in Corning, Painted Post and Gang Mills.

A highlight of the picnic was the arrival of the bus affectionately named "Mud Hen" which carried volunteers to the flood area.
