Urban Planner Decries 'Exclusionary Zoning'

Government in general supports discriminatory land development by enforcing controls that concentrate low and moderate income families and non-whites in the inner core of the metropolitan region, a nationally known urban planner told Monroe County's Housing Council and press representatives last week.

"Exclusionary suburban zoning in the past has fostered a level of segregation between races and between classes never before seen in Northern metropolitan areas," according to Paul Davidoff, co-director of the Suburban Action Institute of White Plains, who feels that government should insure housing choices for all its citizens.

Davidoff is one of the inventors of "advocacy planning."

Illustrating advocacy planning, he stressed minority groups disproportionately injured by housing conditions the public tolerates should be given a disproportionately greater role in the determination of policy for the Housing Council.

"Those most damaged should have the greatest say in determining how their problems will be solved," said Davidoff.

Of the Council's "Fair Share" program, a plan asking 19 area towns and cities to collaborate in easing the current housing crisis, Davidoff said, "It's good to require every area to open up."

But he added, "It is all done in negative terminology. We must use positive terms. Government should provide for people as government is set up to do."

"Corporate power, as much as public power, is responsible for growing de jure segregation

in metropolitan Rochester," the speaker stated.

He said corporations that have moved from city to suburbs and have not demanded that the suburban community provide housing for workers, "have accepted and contributed to the segregation in metropolitan Rochester."

Of the Housing Council's goals, the veteran planner said, "The Housing Council must see

that the goal of 80,000 new housing units for low and moderate income families is an urgent priority."

Davidoff and his wife, Linda, addressed the first session of the Metropolitan Issues Seminar sponsored by the Junior League, Four Downtown Churches, Rochester Downtown Ecumenical Ministry and the Housing Council last week end.

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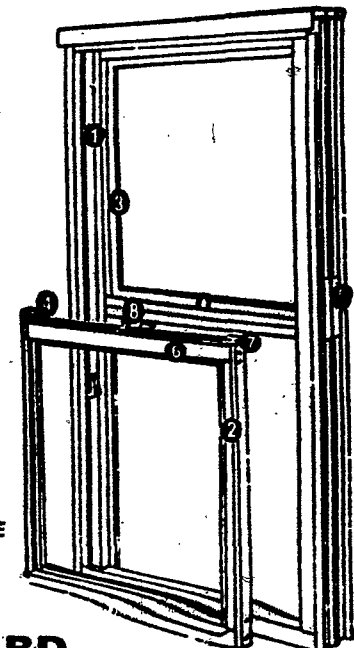
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
