Teachers Urged To Leadership In Renewal Year

The Northeast Region of the diocese sees teachers as the prime force behind the year of renewal and plans to use them as organizational leaders.

Approximately 100 elementary school and religious education teachers from the 13 parishes in the region met last Wednesday at St. James' school for a lecture on how to implement the Bishop's Mission of the Church paper in their existing syllabus.

"It is the first attempt to do anything with faculties on a regional level," explained the organizer of the program, Sister Edwardine Weaver, RSM, principal of St. James.

It makes sense to start with teachers, Sister Edwardine thinks, since the concept of the year of renewal is an educational process. "As educators it is our role to give leadership and impetus to the year of renewal in our schools and parishes."

Sister Gratia L'Esperance of the adult education division of the religious education office addressed the teachers on the Church since Vatican II, regionalism and the Mission of the Church paper.

The first step, Sister Gratia told the educators, is discussion.

"You are now living and working in various groups. If you don't talk about it with people you live and work with, the year of renewal won't happen," she said.

"The Mission of the Church paper can best be worked in discussion groups, advised the veteran school teacher, who recently received a master's degree from St. Bernard's in Theology.
