Auburn — "A main thing the church has to bring is its human resources, but many people with the desire to do something just don't know how to begin," explained Father Charles Mulligan from the Office of Human Development.

Father Mulligan was speaking at an orientation meeting at St. Mary's for parishioners interested in possible involvement in a seven-session training development course geared to assessment and more effective involvement in community concerns in Auburn.

The training course developed by Father Mulligan, Sister James, and Joseph Torma of the Office of Human Development is being offered in 12 parishes throughout the diocese this year. A prerequisite is that a parish have a parish council with an established human development committee.

"Education is the primary way to develop the young," Father explained, "but we see human development as on-going growth, concern for our own world and human circumstances in which we live."

"All have our own daily problems, but we also have had people in our lives who have changed the course of our lives," Father reflected. "There are the problems of loneliness, alienation, housing and many others in the community. This course is aimed at helping participants effect change."
