## **Coalition Seeks Public Defender Study**

A coalition of 18 community groups is asking the Monroe County Legislature to conduct an evaluation of the public defender's office.

Acting as a spokesman for the coalition at a press conference last Thursday in front of the County Office building, Carolyn Micklem of the Rochester Bail Fund, said, "We are asking for the review that has been proposed to the County Legislature been approved by its Ways and Means Committee and received the support of the Monroe County Bar Association.

Nicholas Varlan, head of the Office of Public Defenders, has indicated he is not opposed to such an evaluation, Mrs. Micklem reported.

The review in question would be conducted by the National Legal Aid and Defenders Association of Chicago.

The objection of the coalition of organizations that work with defendants involved in court cases, is lack of staff.

"There are not enough staff," Mrs. Micklem continued, "the case load is beyond capacity. We want expansion of current reorganization efforts to meet the increasing demand for public defenders."

There is money available for reorganization and additional staff, she maintains.

"Millions of dollars have been made available through the Safe Streets Act. The public defender's office has received \$22,650 a year from that federal program for screening at the city court level, but this is just a drop in the bucket for what they need. They need more money for more staff.'

Mildred Johnson of the Virginia Wilson Interracial Center added that location and services of the public defender's offices are inadequate for really serving the inner city people and the women agreed that the quality of public defenders is uneven.'

"Our primary concern is money to reorganize, and raising public awareness that more than we realize our lives depend on the quality of the public de-fenders. We think the study is crucial to the justice of this city," Mrs. Micklem said.
