Newman No Longer a 'Club'

Ithaca - Drive along the outer road to the north corner of Ithaca College campus, and there in the basement of Dorm 3, a side door reads Campus Ministry. I went there to interview Father Philip Lioi, Catholic chaplain at Ithaca College, in order to learn what is happening within the Catholic community on campuses today.

There are a number of colleges in the Ithaca aréa - Keuka, Elmira, Tompkins-Cortland, Cornell and Ithaca. They have at least 5,000 Catholic students.

We asked Father Lioi, "What happened to Newman has Club?''

"Newman Clubs," he said, "no longer define the Catholic on campus. Rather throughout the United States it is the Catholic Campus Ministry.".

The purpose is to get away from club status and instead try to stress that there is no church or special meeting place but for people to depend on each other. Mass is said in sev-

eral places during the week and Sundays to re-emphasize this. "First of all," Father Lioi explained, "the values and de-

grees of faith a student has already have been established before he or she arrives on campus. Most students at best arrive with a rather shaky faith.'

Among the positive things happening at Ithaca College was the establishment last year of a Parish Council. Students are exploring ways to not only reach their fellow Catholics on campus but also how to be more active in their home parishes during school recesses. On Sundays, the chaplain has a radio slot in the program "Probe" which he uses to approach the non-church goer.

I talked with one Catholic student whom I had come to know quite well last year to see what she could add to Father Lioi's views. "Group pressure," she said, "ridicules those who continue to go to church regularly. They look on the church as a crutch or they say you go to Mass because it is the way you were brought up not because you want to go." She felt there was a need for activities that would directly involve the Catholic student such as theater Work. shop group or music group. This, she felt, would put Catholics in more contact with each other

The workshop will be conducted by Father David L. Gaesser in connection with the Year of Renewal and will run eight successive Wednesdays, beginning Oct. 25.

The outline for the series:

1st week: What type of role does the priest or pastor perform within a parish board: resource person? decision maker? chairman? facilitator? How much authority can lay people have in a parish board?

2nd week: How can a parish board be formed in such a way as to be an effective board? How within a board meeting?

3rd week: How meaningful goals can be established for the group. How can responsibility be assigned for establishing the goals?

4th week: A study of group process.

5th week: A study of group maturity and group climate.

6th week: A study of the use of different types of evaluation to improve parish boards.

7th week: A study of scapegoating, personal risk in groups and obligation of leaders toward group members.

8th week: Problems in working with parish boards.
