

Community Spirit, Confirmation Hope

Hornell — "Growth of Christian community spirit" is one of Father Albert Delmonte's hopes for the confirmation ceremonies scheduled for Friday, Nov. 10, at St. Ann's Church.

Father Delmonte, former assistant pastor of the parish, who last week moved to Christ the King Parish, Irondequoit, headed the preparation program for the confirmation of the group of 85 children and 15 adults.

Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey will celebrate the confirmation Mass at 7:45 p.m. that day.

Through confirmation, Father Delmonte said "the baptized person receives the indelible character, the seal of the Lord, together with the gift of the

Spirit which conforms him more closely to Christ and gives him the grace of spreading the Lord's presence among men."

He said that the children, as part of their confirmation preparation, were involved in urging parishioners to vote for new members to the parish council.

"A new sense of parish responsibility should be forthcoming for these children, a sense of their mission to help the Catholic community of this area to grow in concern for one another," Father Delmonte said.

Father Delmonte also noted that red confirmation robes which the children will wear at the ceremony were prepared for each child by Mrs. Patrick Mahaney of Arkport.

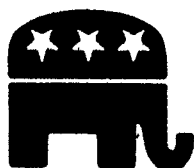
