Cardinal Mooney High School won the City-Catholic Football League championship Sunday by romping over Bishop Kearney High School, 44-12, at Aquinas Stadium.

The Cardinals were undefeated in six games of league competition and, finished with a 7-1 record overall. Their only loss was to Notre Dame of Utica, 8-0, in their first game of the season.

Holy Cross Council Gets Ambulance for Charlotte

Thanks to the strong efforts of the Holy Cross Church Parish Council, full-time ambulance service has been acquired for the Charlotte area.

After five months of negotiations with the city of Rochester, the National Ambulance Co., and St. Bernard's Seminary, an ambulance will be posted 24 hours a day at St. Bernard's. The seminary has agreed to lease parking space and an apartment close to its south building and the south driveway to Lake Avenue.

Marcia Reynders, chairman of the Holy Cross Parish Council's Human Development Committee said that the need for an ambulance was great in Charlotte, first because previous delays in service due to the area's geographic location, and second, because of two Urban Development Corporation highrises for the elderly that will soon be built.

The ambulance service is currently on a three-month trial period, after which further negotiations will decide whether or not it will become permanent. Mrs. Reynders said she was confident that it would.

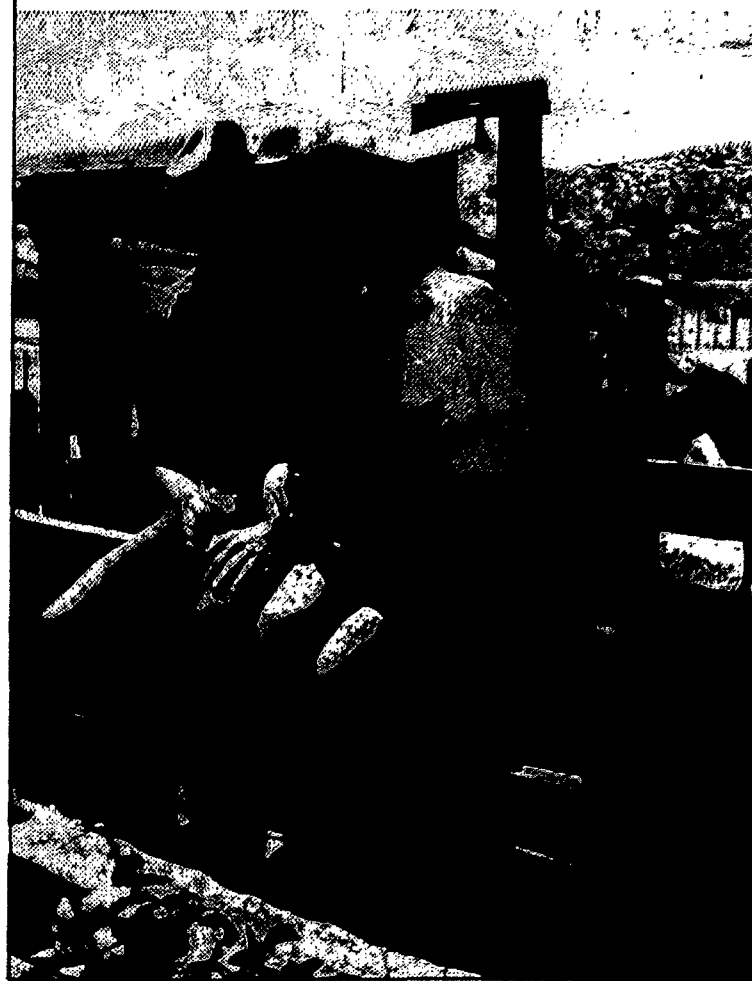
Electronic Concert Scheduled
