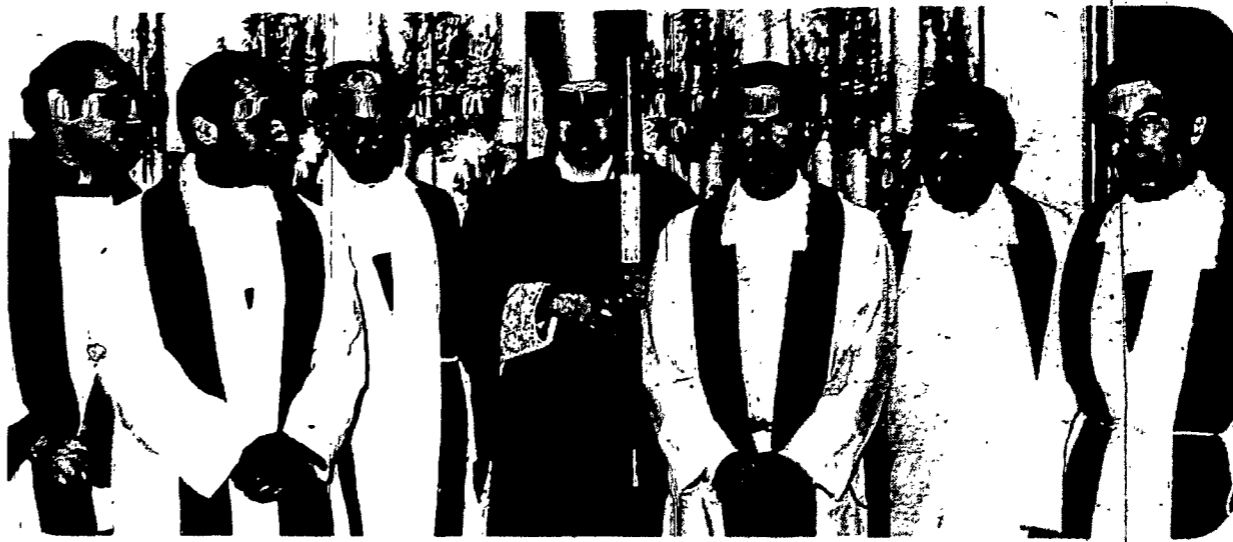

Wayland Child Center Has Room

Wayland — Wayland's Child Development Center now has room for about 10 more children. Area parents who are interested in their youngsters' participation in the local program are being invited to visit the center, opened in April following nearly two years of planning by Wayland residents under the direction of Project REACH in Perkinsville.

The center is financed by the Appalachian Regional Commission through 1977. Financial support has also come from the Gunlocke Co., Inc., in Wayland and an application for United Fund assistance also has been submitted. Center officials said parents pay a sliding scale fee from \$15 per week down depending on family income.

History, Bible Courses Begin at Ithaca Parish

Ithaca — Immaculate Conception Parish started an adult religious education program this month. High school juniors and seniors may choose this program if they wish, or if they cannot attend their regular classes.

Each Tuesday evening, 8-8:55, Father David Mura, associate pastor, will teach "History of the Church". The program will trace

the development of the Church from the time of the Apostles to the present day. Included in this curriculum will be Church Doctrine growth, changes, past and present, Fathers of the Early Church and the Reformation and Counter-Reformation, Vatican II Council, its influence and definitions will be discussed also. Texts are the Bible and Documents of Vatican II. Notes will be provided.

From 9:05 to 10 on the same night Father Richard Beligotti will teach a course on "The Acts of the Apostles" going through the basic books of the New Testament. This course is open to those in Father Mura's class as well as any who choose to come. Curriculum coverage will include dates of compositions, relationships and unity of authorship name and relationship, to Paul's Letters and Luke's Gospels. Text needed: a Bible.

Both classes will take place at Immaculate Conception School, room 108, via the Buffalo Street entrance. Registration fee is \$2 per person and covers costs of paper and refreshments. Members of the parish who are involved in religious education programs for children may come free of charge. Bibles and Documents of Vatican II will be on sale during class time.

Further information may be obtained from Father Beligotti or Father Mura at 273-6121. Classes will meet every Tuesday evening except the third Tuesday of the month when the Parish Council meets.
