sisters and three of his brothers are also in this country.

One is working in New Jersey, another in Manhattan. The third is a student at St. Bonaventure, also sponsored by Monsignor Kaiser. Two of his sisters are educated. One is a teacher and one is a doctor in Moroccan.

Msgr. Kaiser has had a great impact on Salem. "The priest's philosophy, says Salem admiringly, is "to help people and he will do it for anyone he meets, for any needy person.

"He didn't approach me as a Christian, but as a human being."

Such treatment, though Salem admires it, appreciates it and wants to emulate it, only serves to confuse the young Moroccan.

He knows if he returns to Morocco he is assured of a high position. He will be highly educated when he finishes his American education and he has a brother who is a member of parliament.

But an important position in Morocco will only prohibit him from doing anything for the poor of that country.

"If I go back to Morocco," he

said, "they will fix me in a high place and won't let me help others. There the rich get richer with no concern for others' rights."

Salem considers the United States a country with many

problems, "but in any country there are problems, and I feel this is a country where a lot of people will do something about the problems."

He thinks America is now in the midst of a revolution.

"I feel it is a revolution. Everyone knows what is going on and all get involved by working with drug addicts or in hospitals. In other countries man is trying to form himself; here a lot of people are trying to do something for others."
