Three Area Priests Slated to Retire

Three priests of the Rochester Diocese will retire from their pastorates in January, the Pastoral Office announced this week.

Msgr. William J. Naughton of St. Anne's, Rochester, and Father Edward H. Hartmann of St. Mary of the Assumption, Scottsville, have reached retirement age, the announcement said, and Father William J. Riefer of St. Joseph's, Wayland, is retiring because of his health.

Msgr. Charles V. Boyle, who has been pastor of St. John's on Humboldt Street, Rochester, since 1959, will move to St. Anne's. Other replacements will be announced in about two weeks.

Msgr. Naughton received his title as a domestic prelate in 1957. A priest for 45 years, he has spent half that time at St. Anne's. He was assigned to the parish in June, 1950, when it was 20 years old. In his first year there, he bought a nine-room house for use as a convent. Later, he directed a fund drive that led to the building of the present church, opened in 1959.

He was born in Rochester, and attended Corpus Christi School, and the diocesan seminaries. Ordained in 1927, he was assigned to Holy Rosary. He continued to assist there while on the staff of St. Bernard's Seminary, 1932-1945. He became pastor of St. Peter and Paul, Elmira, in 1945. During the following year, the parish property was damaged heavily by a Chemung River flood. The work of cleaning, restoring and rebuilding continued into 1949.

Father Hartmann, ordained from St. Bernard's in June, 1928, has been Scottsville pastor since 1941. Under his direction, a new building was provided to serve as a parish meeting place and catechetical center.

He is a native of Rochester, where he attended St. Mary's School before entering St. Andrew's Seminary. His early assignments were at Sacred Heart and St. Monica's, Rochester; St. Patrick's, Elmira, and St. Patrick's, Owego.

NEEDIEST CASES

Mr. R. has recently arrived here from Puerto Rico. In Puerto Rico Mr. R. drove semitractor trailer trucks and had completed a year of college evenings. Mr. R. does not speak English and therefore has only been able to achieve employment in a downtown restaurant as a maintenance man. His \$100 a week salary doesn't go far for a family of 11.

Mrs. A. is 23 and expecting a baby in a few months. She is separated from her husband who has left the state and she is receiving welfare assistance. With the material assistance and emotional support of a caseworker she is preparing a small apartment for the arrival of her baby. She will need much more than what her meager welfare budget will provide.

Mrs. B., a young, retarded mother is separated from her husband and is trying to make a home for her 9-year-old son. She is a very loving mother and with the patient guidance of a caseworker has made great progress in providing an adequate and secure home for her son. Mrs. B. will continue to need the guid-

ance and support of a caseworker and extra money would be helpful in providing for a happier Christmas for this little family.

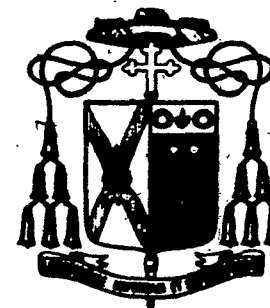

He refuses to consider placement in a foster home since he feels it is his responsibility to rear his son. Mr. C. works when he is able, but because of serious medical problems is presently unemployed.
