Human Development Training Action Programs Developed

Auburn - "I am amazed at what is going on in this commu-nity," and "Everything is just fine and you are not going to change anything," were con-flicting attitudes encountered by participants in the Human De-velopment training course at St velopment training course at St. Mary's, during practical research assignments, which put theory to work and culminated in two action proposals presented to the parish council.

The Human Development Committee at St. Mary's, which is accountable to the parish council, selected the areas of family life education and health care center needs as initial concerns to be explored further.

Susan Connors and Charlene Sawchurch were selected as interim chairmen with the permanent chairman to be elected at a later date.

In addition to 24 hours of formal sessions which began Oct. 4 and concluded Nov. 15, the 16 participants invested several hundred hours exploring generalized topics of concern in the Auburn area to find out what problems there were, and to determine if and how St. Mary's parish could help.

Receiving attention were the needs of the elderly, racism, youth, health, drugs and alcohol,

Father Mulligan, commenting on the training goals said. "The key is not to base your actions on opinions or common attitudes, but to go to the source, talk to people on both sides of the issues, pin down what is not happening in a community, seek advice from professionals or field people affected by the problems.

Father Mulligan indicated the importance of committee identification as it opens doors not available to the individual.

The Office of Human Development training team pointed out that projects investigated by parishes may become the regional human development commit-tees' concern. Each parish would research different areas as each parish in time should have a humán development committee.,
