Mental Health Commentary

The societal drift from Victorian suppression to the new attitudinal permissiveness does not seem to have solved many problems in sexual adjustment. Valid statistics are hard to find, even among government mandated reporting of new cases of venereal disease, but there are some indicators.

Counselors have reported that college students may be more confused than ever regarding healthy sexual behavior in the new liberated college atmosphere. Psychiatrists and others who work with troubled people do not see a lessening of those problems related to sexual adjustment in the broadest sense.

Sex education can be divided into two parts:

1. The physical and physiological aspects.
2. The attitudinal aspects.

Most children discover the superficial differences between boys and girls by the time they are five years old.

This part of sex education is relatively easily taught to the interested person with an open mind in the physician's office, the classroom, and even behind the garage.

The real problem in sex education in children is the attitudinal one and fundamentally involves a concept of self and a sophistication in interpersonal relationships. Reduced to their lowest common denominator, problems in sexual adjustment may be less related to knowledge of the reproductive systems than to inhibitions, overuse and perverted use.

Other bodily systems fall heir to similar problems, but usually are not associated with as intense a drive, especially in adolescence when the drive is strong, the control mechanisms weak and the opportunities for healthy discharge few. The effect on the young of the open exposure to erotic sex remains to be seen. It may be a civil right, but some of us think it a mental health wrong. Time will tell.

The maturing child needs to recognize his gender role and his sex role. That one is a biological male or female determines his gender role. It will determine his mode of dress, which public lavatory he uses, his use of Mr., Miss, Mrs., or Ms. before his name, etc. How he relates to members of his own sex and people of the opposite sex is determined by his sex-role. Herein lies the essence of meaningful "sex education" since it involves how one perceives himself and how he relates to others. This process of developing a sexual identity is a complicated, multifaceted process which is primarily learned in the close relationships of the growing years in and out of the family.

Rally Scheduled To Push for School Aid

Invitations have been issued to parents of all children in Catholic high schools and parochial elementary schools to attend a rally for financial assistance from the government, at Bishop Kearney High School Sunday evening Jan. 14.

Featured speaker will be Louis Contiguglia, an Auburn Lawyer, who is carrying an appeal to the United States Supreme Court on behalf of nonpublic school and tax credits. He will explain the arguments he will present to the court in an attempt to establish that such aid is constitutional and that denial of such aid is an abridgment of our freedom and religious liberty.
