# New Auburn School Receives Name

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Auburn - Blessed Trinity is Auburn — Blessed Trinity is the new name for the Catholic elementary school to open in September as a result of the merger of St. Alphonsus, Holy Family, and Sacred Heart schools. The name for the school to be located in what is now St. Alphonsus school was selected by the student body of the three sčhools.

The name was announced at an open house Jan. 4 at which Father Daniel Brent, superintendent of diocesan schools, and Sister Irene Gardner, assistant superintendent for instuction, spoke. Both have been involved in the evolution of plans over the past year.

Father Brent indicated that while the success of the new school will depend on the people's willingness to support it enroll their children, he was enthusiastic over the potentials in this kind of endeavor. In addition to expected substanin tial financial savings, he outlined distinct advantages of a large enrollment, including greater potential for teacher cooperation and sharing of ideas, more in-service training possibilities, and joint planning.

Definite staffing needs cannot be determined until registration is final, but Father Brent indicated an attempt will be made to draw from the three existing school faculties. It was reported there are 28 lay teachers and 13 teaching nuns in the present schools.

Father Brent has been assured by the religious communities that consolidation will not affect appointment of sisters. If anything, the communities have bent over backwards to accom-modate the situation. However, other factors do affect availability of sisters which can't be fore-seen. Consolidation will certainly put more sisters into contact with the children through grouping and departmentalization.

The priests from the three schools will be involved in the religious education program making classroom celebrations and liturgies more feasible.

Father Brent, feels that with the expanded faculty a true feeling of Christian community will be more realistic. He feels the whole visibility of Catholic education will be enhanced.

Father Brent indicated that experiences such as the Elmira school consolidation have illustrated that consolidation need not interfere with parish identity as this can be maintained through parish liturgy, CYO activities and sacramental programs.

A new stress in Catholic educa-tion is the "human development aspect" which takes the theory of Christianity and brings it into the neighborhood through works of mercy.

Sister Irene discussed expanded curriculum possibilities including increased grouping of children according to ability, large group instruction, teacher specialization and modular modular scheduling.

Combined learning resources will provide greater variety of materials. Sports can be developed more fully and carried back to parish sponsored events.

Sister Irene sees a greater use of personnel and resources from the community, especially in the area of potential career ed-ucation. A core of volunteer aides could be developed, training of-fered, and more effectively used.

Msgr. Joseph Sullivan, pastor of Holy Family, felt the action of the three parishes was a patriotic thing as they were preserving given boundless good things to the country and will do so in the future

Father Raymond Wahl, pastor of Sacred Heart, said he hoped the new school would become a model for schools throughout the state.

Father Raymond Wuest, pastor of St. Alphonsus, was pleased with this united effort to assure an educational experience where one can still see a crucifix on the wall and say a prayer throughout the day. He hoped by working together it would bring about a school that can exist for many years to come, one which will grow and increase by the efforts of those interested in having a Catholic education for their children.

Martin E. Fanning, president of the Blessed Trinity school board, introduced Sister Walter Anne O'Malley, who will be the first principal at Blessed Trinity School.

Sister Walter Anne commented on the parishes' courage in taking risks so Catholic education will continue to flourish in the area.

A question and answer ses-sion was followed by an open house to inspect the school facilities in the St. Alphonsus building. An open house will be plan-ned for the students in the Sacred Heart and Holy Family schools.





The committee is expected to provide a forum for dialogue and research on family-related problems. Composed of 24 members, many of whom are civil lawyers, he committee will be headed by Cardinal Maurice Roy of Que-bec, who is president of the Vati-
