Sister Carmencita Talks to Teachers

Geneva - Sister Carmencita Voisard, educational consultant for the Sisters of the Precious Blood, Dayton, Ohio, conducted an all day workshop entitled "Continuous Progress", Jan. 26, at St. Francis DeSales School in Geneva, sponsored by the Finger Lakes Principals Association:

A specialist in educational in-novations, Sister Carmencita focused on open classroom programs, continuous progress concepts, and techniques in in-dividualized instruction.

"Today's trend is towards making the dynamics of the classroom more human," explained Sister Carmencita. "We are stressing the value of human development, not just the facts. We are interested in building self concept, encouraging more personal responsibility in the student and the development of the totak capacity of individual sudents.'

After putting basic assumptions about the continuous progress approach into perspective, Sister Carmencita outlined details for planning for progress, continuous skills, teaming and scheduling. Guidelines for selfevaluation were examined, mod-els of individualized instruction programs presented, and suggestions for evaluating continuous progress and reporting to parents were demonstrated.

CRS Continues Managua Aid

New York (RNS) - Almost a half-million dollars worth of food, the largest Catholic Relief Services food shipment to victims of the Dec. 23 Nicaraguan earthquake, has been shipped from Houston to spur the "food for work" program aimed at motivating Nicaraguans in rebuilding the devastated capital of Managua.

The 3,260 tons of food will also be used to supplement the emergency feeding program sponsored by the U.S. bishops relief agency in Nicaragua, said Bishop Edward E. Swanstrom; CRS executive director.

The Catholic agency's person-nel in Nicaragua have already recruited some 40,000 persons to take part in the "food for work" program. They anticipate that as many as 200,000 Nicaraguans will help in the reconstruction of Courier-Journal

Since the earthquake occurred, CRS has delivered or shipped to Nica agua more than 7,700 tons of supplies — food, clothing, medisine, building materials — vilued at almost \$2 million. The cost of transportation has resulted in an ever-increasing drain on the financial resources of the Catholic agency and a fund drive has been initiated.

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
