## Spiritual Care Unit Planned at St. Mary's

Something new, a spiritual care department, is in the works for St. Mary's Hospital.

Presently assisting at the hospital are chaplain Father John V. Rosse who has been there since 1959, 10 Daughters of Charity, and a Protestant clergyman who works there half a day a week. Parish priests also visit their parishioners.

But the effort is not comprehensive enough to meet present needs, according to the hospital chaplain and administrators.

A department of pastoral care allows a hospital to provide planned, organized and coordinated delivery of the services needed to meet the spiritual needs of patients.

Father Rosse stressed that the organizing of this new office does not imply that "we have not given adequate spiritual care for 100 years, since we've been here.

## St. Monica's Adds Kindergarten

St. Monica's School will open a kindergarten next September and continue its eight grades. Sister Anne Marie, principal, announced last week.

Registration is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, March 1 and 2, 9 a.m.-3 p.m., and the following Monday and Tuesday evenings, 7-8 p.m.

The school, at 841 Genesee, serves about 350 children "of all backgrounds and all faiths" in its 19th and 3rd ward neighborhood, the principal said. She pointed out that, contrary to a current report, St. Monica's is not involved in consolidation plans and has no prospects of federal aid.

Sisters have always been on the staff at the hospital, Father Rosse continued, but they always had other jobs. Now there is a specialized, full-time nun to share with the in-depth counseling of both patients and families of the critically ill.

Hospital administration, nurses, doctors, staff and local clergy are involved in planning the ecumenical venture which is growing out of concern for "total care of patients," said Father Rosse in explaining the philosophy behind the program.

The chaplain is enthused about the "unlimited" advantages the department will afford, such as the eventual hiring of a full-time Protestant clergyman, training area clergy in counseling, and involvement of the regions and parish human development committees.

He sees a great opportunity for human development committees in patient followup work, or in helping survivors of deceased. After the funeral his job ends, he explained, and usually that is when survivors need the most care. The clerical assistance the new department would provide could keep parishes in-

formed of needed followup.
