The film depicted the advancement of a baby from conception to birth, showing aborted babies and the process by which they were aborted.

Dr. Mark noted a decline in the deliveries of unmarried girls quence there are fewer bables available for adoption.

He said, "oftentimes, the attitude of the parents influences the girl to have an abortion. The fetus is not just 'a mass of cells' but a perfectly formed fetus early in pregnancy.

Dr. Frisk said that "at 12 weeks gestation, the sex of the baby can be determined and that the 'grasp reflex' occurs at 16 weeks gestation. Life exists from the first day.

Miss Hanley presented the psychological aspects of abortion stating that many believe it is an "anti-motherhood culture" we are living in today. She said, "it is a materialistic culture and we are un-American if we have more than 2 children. In mental health, she said, "we look at what type the person is who seeks abortion. The unhappy-athome girl or the girl intent upon proving her femininity. If the girl 'interprets her parents as being too strict, she will experiment sexually to get back at them.'

"It can be a bid for love from the parents. In most cases the person is entirely dependent upon her parents for financial sup-port and by the parents coercion, will go ahead with the abortion.

Miss Hanley said, the resulting guilt feelings grow deeper and deeper and we have people coming to us for counseling even 25 years after their having had an abortion." She concluded by saying, "we cannot predict how someone will react to her situa-

Miss Callahan determines the moral values of her students by integrating a film dealing with the attitudes of young peo-ple to the stresses of elderly peo-ple. "What should be done for the infirm, the elderly, help them or ignore their problems?" In most cases Miss Callahan stated, 'my students have great compassion for those in need and seem to have deep-seated moral values. "Up until a child is 15 years old, the parents' guidance is unquestioned and then it is time for the young person to be responsible for his actions, to choose the path he or she will follow."

"Respect for Life must be instilled in our children. There must be the moral concept, not merely a concept of fragment-

Miss Callahan summed up her remarks by Saying, "We must realize the unpleasant truth of abortion. Abortion is not a way of life. A new organization called 'Birthright' is being formed in the area and will be implemented by several doctors. It is a marvelous organization and needs help from those interested in becoming involved. It is quite a job just to keep up with the Abortionist' literature. This material has to be read and takes very much time, indeed."

The program was sponsored by the Knights as part of a statewide program in support of re-pealing the liberalized abortion laws in New York State. The


