Mental Health Commentary

What's the use of worrying? It sometimes is worthwhile! Worrying makes us concentrate on our problems and seek solutions for them. Worrying may help us avoid problems. But, when a problem has no reasonable solution, why worry?

During the post World War II period, when the secret of the atomic bomb's terrifying, destructive force was reported to be in the possession of an unfriendly country, Americans began to worry that it might be used in an attack against us. A "bomb shelter in every yard" became the solution. The greater the worrying, the more advanced the plans. With the discovery of the hydrogen bomb, against which there is no protection, the bomb shelter had faded. What was the use of worrying about such a destructive force against which there could be no adequate protection? There was no solution, so why worry about it?

We are born with the potential to be afraid. Fear is a useful emotion since it helps us to avoid those situations which are dangerous to our health and welfare.

Observation of children reveals that in the second half of the first year, they tend to show a fear of strangeness and strangers, sometimes called "the eighth month anxiety". In the second year, being separated from mother is frightening for many children; this fear has been called "the separation anxiety". Later on there is a fear of being hurt. There is a maturational sequence to these anxieties in children which have a utility and usually are handled well by the healthy person.

The feeling of fear can be realistic as when one is facing an acute danger which may be injurious to his health or his state of mind. Here, worrying may be useful in solving the problem.

"Anxiety" is a feeling like fear but the danger is locked in the unconscious mind. Sometimes in adults, this anxiety gets fanned into acute attacks we call "anxiety reaction."

Recently there seems to have been a rash of "overanxious children" who are said to be doing poorly in school; they daydream, have a short attention span, don't finish their homework and do poorly on tests. Some of these have been thought to have perceptual handicaps because they couldn't seem to comprehend the school-work. Frequently, the parents were tutoring the child at home at night and, unknowingly, aggravated the problem by making the child feel more frustrated, hopeless and anxious. As the mental paralysis increased, the parents were worried more about the child's academic career and worried the child more, so the problem got worse. Worrying in these instances didn't help in finding a solution to the problem but contributed to it. So what's the use of worrying when it isn't worthwhile?
