



ALL IN THE FAMILY

Dr. Kenneth Clark, an eminent black educator who frequently does battle with both black separatists and white segregationists, was the subject of a recent New York Times Sunday Magazine story.

The interview which was printed in dialogue form dealt mainly with the educator's frustrated attempts to see black children being taught as opposed to their simply attending school.

Among other items that have rightfully drawn Dr. Clark's fury is the suggestion (by other blacks) that ghetto children should be taught black English or ghettoese.

To quote Dr. Clark: "As I observed in Washington, the people who were talking about teaching these children black English spoke impeccable English. One of the members of the school board — a black man with a Harvard-type accent — said in an open school board meeting that I was seeking to frustrate these children by having them taught white middle-class English. I looked at him and I said, 'All I want of these children is that when they speak, they be given the same attention which you're being given now in spite of your nonsense.'"

Dr. Clark's words hit a nerve in me that was sensitized before I was of school age. I am the granddaughter of two European-born grandparents who in spite of living 50 years in America never were able to express themselves in anything clearer than a conspicuously inadequate pidgin English. They reverted back to their native tongue when con-

versing with their sons. The rest of us — daughters-in-law and grandchildren — got mangled English.

Long before I read "Pygmalion" for the first time I was aware that it was not a human being's color, nationality, sex, clothes or any other external that marked him so much as the way he spoke.

If Eleanor Roosevelt's protruding teeth disappeared in the mesmerizing effect of her words, if Henry Higgins could turn a guttersnipe into a lady with the aid of phonetics, then the importance of a person's race or his place of origin must diminish accordingly as his fluency increases.

In other words the ability to communicate with clarity and verve may be, undoubtedly is, the first step in the process of assimilation.

And the ethnic nuances of speech we would proudly retain may be a luxury we cannot afford, at least not until we have earned attention for our ideas in the "impeccable English" Dr. Clark refers to above.

The lesson is clear — and not just for those with a so-called disadvantaged background. Parents of all economic classes should not forget that the self-confidence they want their children to have and exhibit comes in great measure from the child's ability to express what he thinks and feels.

And the better he says it the greater power he wields.

'Protect Jewish Youth' From Key 73 Conversion

New York [RNS] — Jewish young people "must be protected against a conversion onslaught" such as Key 73, according to the president of the New York Board of Rabbis.

Speaking at the 92nd annual meeting of the organization, which represents 1,000 Conservative, Orthodox, and Reform rabbis, Rabbi William Berkowitz asked:

"To put it bluntly, is one of the aims of Key 73 to convert Jews to Christianity? If so, then just as bluntly, our answer is we do not want such an activity in our midst. We do not need it, and we will fight it."

Rabbi Berkowitz maintained that "the emphasis in the Key 73 campaign is on the young, and

the Jewish young people must be protected against a conversion onslaught. It is not enough to say that if our young people have sincere Jewish convictions they can resist the attempts of proselytizers. We know better."

We cited the Jews for Jesus and Children of God, and commented, "we know how strong arguments of simple dogma can be against the inquiring minds of young people brought up in an atmosphere of equality."

One area of Key 73 that demands "direct action, on our part," Rabbi Berkowitz asserted, is that "propaganda for the program and efforts at conversion can and most probably will appear in places where traditionally there should be no such activity."
