


# **Local OHD Submits Poverty Proposals**

Twenty-two proposals for Human Development Campaign funds mailed last week to the national office in Washington, D.C. were for causes ranging from self-help housing projects to boy scouting opportunities for poor rural youth. Money sought adds up to \$913,173.

Human for Campaign Development guidelines specify that to be eligible projects must involve self-help, which they define as projects where the poor have the dominant voice in planning and implementation.

Local grants will also be made by eight task forces throughout the diocese. A cross section of lay people make up the task forces, whose job it is to solicit proposals from self-help groups in their areas, evaluate them according to national campaign criteria and decide which proposals will apply for local and which for national.

The proposals that go to the national office must range from \$10,000 to \$200,000. Requests for less than \$10,000 can be handled locally provided the task force has the amount needed.

Seventy-five per cent of the annual Human Development collection goes to the national office and 25 per cent of it stays in the diocese. The money that remains here is then divided up among the task forces according to how much their area contributed in the collection.

"We have a lot of problems with that 25/75 per cent split," Sister Josepha Toomey of the

local OHD would like to see a new system devised.

The 22 funding proposals came from eight counties and ranged in amount from \$10,000 for the medical-dental clinic in Rushville, Ontario County, to \$144,340 for a comprehensive pre-school center for retarded children in Steuben County.

Of the eight task forces, four -Cayuga, Tioga, Tompkins and Livingston — did not send any proposals to the national office.

The requests from the remaining four task forces broke down this way: eight in the housing categories, one for health services, one for a legal aid program, six in education, five to promote economic development, and one for transportation of senior citizens.

The number of local proposals is not yet known, according to Sister Josepha. "Local task forces deal with them according to their own time schedule," explained the sister in charge of national campaign fund proposals.

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There are so many different departments of the federal government, and so many different studies and reports done each year, that it is hard to find your way among them. Your best bet is to write to the Superintendent of Documents (U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402), and ask to receive the free twice-monthly mailing of "Selected U.S. Covernment Publications."

It will take a council leader only a few minutes to review the 16-page publication, but he will usually find a low-cost pamphlet or report that can help the discouncil in its work.

Is your finance or budget committee trying to make an accurate determination of what might reasonably be expected in contributions from the parishioners? For \$1.25 you can get a copy of "Zip Code Data, Individual Income Tax Returns" (11AA,: 4804-0499), that will provide income and tax liability information by postal zip code number. By checking the appropriate zone, or zones, for your parish you can get a pretty accurate reading of the income level of your parishioners.

"When You Need Help" is a 10cent pamphlet that briefly describes a few of the federal and state programs which give aid to families with dependent children, old-age assistance, aid to permanently and totally disabled, and many medical assistance programs. Its catalog number is 5AA. 1763-0003.
