Continuity Is Her Job

Auburn — "The coordinator is the person who takes on the function of seeing all the religious education activities in a parish hang together, provides continuity and sees all is well integrated into the total program," explained Miss Patricia Mellish, religious education coordinator at St. Mary's.

When Miss Mellish came last September, she found a well organized CCD program serving approximately 550 children in the first grade through high school. She is available to St. Mary's school for program evaluation and individual teacher consultation.

A graduate of Nazareth College with a BA in theology, Miss Mellish has done graduate work in religious studies at LaSalle in Philadelphia. She has taught middle school and has served previously as a religious education coordinator.

As coordinator, Miss Mellish incorporates current material into one unifying theme and assists teachers at all levels in carrying out their plans. She feels that the coordinator can inspire members of the parish to contribute to religious education according to their talents and abilities, thus widening the base of parishioner involvement.

Teacher development has been through frequent meetings at a particular grade level to provide help with lesson planning, projects, background material in scripture and teaching techniques. While the program remains constant, the challenge lies in ways to bring the text book alive and relevant to everyday experiences.

Some teachers attended a recent diocesan workshop. Miss Mellish would like to see ad-

formal training, ditional preferably on an interparish basis. She feels that while teachers need to work on their own grade level, they benefit from programs that put their grade level into per-

A great asset to her role, she says, is her inclusion in weekly staff meetings with Msgr. James D. Cuffney, pastor; Father James Enright, associate pastor, Sister Dorothy Quinn, parish assistant, Sister Barbara Joan, school principal. Awareness of what is going on in all aspects of parish . life puts the coordinator's work into perspective.

This year parental involvement in the sacramental program continued and Miss Mellish views this as an important aspect of adult education. She has instituted a 10-week evening course in Scripture which is still in progress. A 6 week lenten series an interparish effort by St. Mary's, St. Alphonsus; Sacred Heart and Holy Family, is underway.

Busing Deadline Near For Auburn Students

AUBURN — The deadline for parochial school busing requests April 16, according to Auburn school officials.

Parents of children seeking transportation to the nearest available parochial school in the 1973-74 school year should submit their request to Director of Transportation, Education House, 130 South St., Auburn if they have not already filed a request for transportation. Forms are available at each Auburn parochial school.

Requests must be filed for children who are entering a parochial school for the first time and for those children who will attend a different parochial

school than they attended this year. Parents whose children are presently receiving transportation and will attend the same school next year need not file a request.

Transportation will be provided for pupils in kindergarten through grade 8 who reside within the City of Auburn and live more than one mile from the nearest available parochial school, according to Board of Education policy.

Also eligible for transportation are those pupils in kindergarten through grade 8 who reside within the Auburn City School District, but outside the limits of the City of Auburn and more than six tenths of a mile from the nearest available parochial
