Ordination Slated For Father Schwab

"Make me a Channel of Your Peace" will be the theme of the ordination ceremonies for Father Donald F. Schwab, tomorrow evening, April 12 at 7:30 p.m. in Holy Ghost Church. Bishop Joseph L. Hogan will be the ordaining prelate.

Father Schwab has served at Holy Ghost as a deacon-intern since he completed his studies at St. Bernard's Seminary last June.

He will celebrate the Palm Sunday liturgies at St. Charles Borromeo, his home parish, on Saturday evening, April 14 at 7 p.m. and at Holy Ghost on Sunday, April 15, at 12:15 p.m.

Father Schwab, son of Harold and the late Mildred Schwab, attended St. Thomas, Number 42 and Sacred Heart Schools. After high school at St. Andrew's Seminary he studied at St. John Fisher College, graduating in 1968

with a B.A. in Philosophy. While doing theological studies leading to a B.D. degree at St. Bernard's Seminary, Fr. Schwab was involved in pastoral work at the Rochester School for the Deaf, St. Charles, St. Paul of the Cross, and the parishes of Avon as well as in the teacher-training program for the Diocese.

He also worked as a recreation counselor for five years at St. Joseph's Villa. During the summer of 1971 he was part of the Clinical - Pastoral - Education program at the Sacramento Medical Center in Sacramento, Cal.

In these programs, now a part of the preparation for ministry in the diocese, the student is grouped with other divinity students of all faiths for an intense period of clinical exposure to sickness and crisis-related situations.
