Chrism Mass Program Being Finalized

More than 50 prelates, sisters, clerics and laymen will be major participants in Tuesday evening's Mass of Chrism and blessing of Schuyler and Chemung Counties; the holy oils at St. Mary's in Father Frederick W. Bush, Canandaigua.

The rites, which are expected to draw participants and observers from every corner of the diocese, will be marked by several unusual innovations designed to symbolize the development of the regional character of diocesan administration and the ministerial role of the layman in the contemporary church.

Traditionally held in the Cathedral on Holy Thursday, the ceremonies this year will not only take place in Canandaigua, but will be held Tuesday, April 17, beginning at 8 p.m.

Also this year, 12 men from St. Bernard's Seminary will be initiated into the clerical state, in rites never before seen by the general public.

The major function of the rituals is to prepare several holy oils to be used a various times through out the year. Among the oils are chrism, a mixture of perfume and oil, which is used to anoint those receiving confirmation, oil of catechumens, which is used in the baptism rites, oil of the sick, which is used in administering the sacrament of the sick.

Sister Judith will be assisted by an elected four-member council a central administration and several boards and committees.


