Columnist Sidney Harris recently wrote that he didn't think it was as important what children read as the fact that they read at all. Amen! Amen!

Harris pointed out that his own favorite reading as a boy was "dime novels," categorized as junk reading by those who made up the "approved" lists.

When he reached a suitable age where his tastes changed he gave up the "junk," ostensibly to go on to more conventional reading.

Harris figures the junk reading not only did him no harm but probably did considerable good in providing a harmless outlet for his fantasy-life.

My own secret reading place was under our porch which rose a good seven feet off the ground and was screened underneath by a latticework stripping, a common practice when the house was built into a side of the hill as ours was.

There I read all the intimate details of domestic travail found in my mother's magazines learning almost as much there as I did on my forbidden forays into the house at the bottom of the hill where resided our local jukes and Kallikaks.

A great many woman's magazines are still full of the same insane "love stories" bearing almost no resemblance to any real relationship between a man and a woman. But I am eternally grateful to them for the fact that they inspired in me an insatiable greed for the printed word.

Thus far I have no inkling that our five-year-old and eight-year-old are reading anything but that which would be considered suitable. (This is chiefly because it is cheaper to borrow books from school and the public library than it is to plunk down 35 cents for a comic book.)

On the other hand they have been exposed to a more lurid and violent brand of garbage via the television set than their father or I was ever privy to in the impressive stages.

We have twisted the channel selector only a couple of times and that was when the proximity of bedtime to a particularly frightening dramatization threatened to spawn some nightmarish dreams.

The value in allowing them this freedom is I think twofold. They learn at an early age to recognize garbage when they see it and hopefully they will outgrow the urge for the cheaply sensational faster than if we were to make it more desirable by forbidding it.

Up to Date Touch for Old Story

One of the world's oldest stories, Christ's Resurrection, will be set to a contemporary music form when the Concert Chorale presents its annual concert on Palm Sunday weekend, April 14 and 15.

The work is called "Sic Transit," and was originally commissioned for St. John the Divine Cathedral in New York City. The singing Sisters of St. Joseph who make up the Chorale collaborated with Prof. Timothy Sullivan of Nazareth College for their version, which will combine taped elements with live performance, light effects and organ.

The concert will contain a diversity of musical styles — from choral classics to popular music (including "Love is a Many Splendored Thing," which provided the concert theme). One highlight will be a special children's chorus in an excerpt from the musical, "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown."

Others include a group of religious songs which contrasts the simplicity of three American Protestant hymns against the complexity of Hayden's "Magnificat" accompanied by a string trio; "The Impossible Dream" from the well-known contemporary classic, "Man of La Mancha"; a group of American spirituals.

In Rochester, performances will be held at 300 East River Road in the St. Agnes High School auditorium. On Saturday, April 14, curtain time is 8 p.m.; the following afternoon, it is 3 p.m.
