disclosures that federal health officials are debating the use of unborn human fetuses for research, decried the lack of ethical guidelines and "reverence for life" inherent in such experimentation.

Msgr. James T. McHugh, who heads the USCC's Family Life Division, said the research programs being considered by the National Institutes of Health "is a further indication of the eroding value placed on human life in a permissive abortion atmosphere."

He also charged that the U.S.

Supreme Court must share the responsibility for "encouraging experiments on fetuses" because of its recent abortion decision which said that the life of the fetus has no compelling value prior to viability.

Sister Virginia Schwager, SP, director of the USCC's Health Affairs division, said that disclosures of such proposed experimentation on living fetuses "reflect an immeasurable lack of reverence for human life."

The disclosures of debate by federal health officials over the use of newly-delivered human fetuses, produced by abortions, for medical research before they

die, were made in the Washington Post April 10. The report said debate centered on whether federal funds can support such research in a nation where millions consider labortion immoral.

The Washington Post said such a proposal to allow research on living fetuses was made to NIH some 19 months ago by the agency's Human Embryology and Development Study section, and approved with modifications in March 1972 by the National Advisory Child Health and Human Development Council. The council, which did not make its statement public, is an advisory body to the National Institute of Child Health and

Human Development, a part of NIH

Officials at NIH, according to the Post's story, reportedly dif-fered on whether the recommendations had actually become NIH policy. The federal agency is the major source of federal funding for medical research.

Msgr. McHugh said: "Experimentation on humans unborn humans included - is not merely a scientific question. It is a moral question requiring clear and carefully drawn ethical guidelines."

Declaring that such guidelines must of necessity be "quite restrictive," he cited "other experiences of scientific research nducted without due regard for ethical consideration ---- such as the atomic bomb (in World War II) and the Tuskegee study (of venereal disease among black men). He added: "We should realize that these questions cannot simply be left to the scientists and researchers."

With respect to the recent Supreme Court decision on abortion, the USCC official said

"news reports of the NIH proposals pinpoint the paradox. searchers experiments on living fetuses obtained by abortion in order to learn more about blood, heart and other diseases in human beings, but the Supreme Court takes the position that 'there has always been strong support for the view that life does not begin until live birth."

Sister Schwager, referring to the Tuskegee study as an "unchecked use of human subjects in scientific research,"said the need for biomedical research is vital. But she added that "it is equally imperative that such investigations be tempered by a proper ethical perspective which is based on profound respect for human dignity?

Such revelations as those made concerning the possible adoption by NIH of a policy on the funding of research programs utilizing as subjects aborted fetuses evidence the fundamental need of Congress to rigorously study and regulate bio-medical experiments involving human beings.
