#### **REACH WALK** SET JUNE 9

**Perkinsville** — The third annual Walk-for-Reach is being planned by the staff and volunteers of REACH. This year's Walk, set for June 9, will follow the same fifteen mile route from Perkinsville to Wayland to Dansville. Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m., at the Perkinsville Rod and Gun Club. -

The walk has become a popular method of fund-raising. Volunteer walkers secure pledges of a certain amount per mile from friends and neighbors who act as sponsors. After the Walk is over, walkers collect the pledges from their sponsors and turn in the money. Last year's walk attracted over 500 hardy hikers with more than 2,000 sponsors who con-/tributed approximately \$10,000. This year, Walk-for-Reach funds will support the boys' and girls' Out REACH program, to expand dental care to area residents, to support existing housing programs, attempt to create a. housing legal assistance program for the low income, and to cover part of the costs of day-to-day operating and maintenance expenses not covered by government of private foundation grants.

Checkpoints will be staffed from the beginning and will amply supply water and foot powder. The walk will climax with refreshments and a band for those who aren't too tired to dance or just listen

In addition to the shuttle service provided for those who park in Perkinsville before the walk, transportation can be provided for walkers to Perkinsville and back to a central location in your community if REACH is contacted ahead of time. As happened last year, REACH will salute those who wish to participate in the Run for **REACH division with trophies for** the first three finishers. Local high schools and area residents are being invited to participate in the Run division.
