

Corning Glass Gives \$150,000 As Flood Relief

The Corning Glass Foundation on Wednesday, June 6, voted in New York City to appropriate \$150,000 for the resumption of the flood recovery program YES (Youth Emergency Service).

Beginning June 25, YES will go into operation for an eight-week period in the Corning-Painted Post area. Between 125 and 150 youths will go to work, scraping and painting houses, doing yard work, and other cleanup activities that still remain to be done after last year's brutal flood.

YES will be run through two outlets, the Office of Human Development and the Mennonite Disaster Service. The groups will split all the responsibilities evenly.

A three-man advisory team will coordinate all YES activity. They are Father Peter Bayer of OHD, Rev. Merle Herr of the Mennonite group, and W. Donald Walker,

manager of facilities at the glass works.

The coordinators will do all of the hiring, which began on Saturday, June 9, and continues for the next two Saturdays before YES officially gets underway.

Job applicants are interviewed at the Corning Armory. YES requires that youths be at least 17 years old and live in the area, and prefers that they themselves were in some way affected by the flood. They must agree to work the full eight weeks.

The Glass Foundation decision to resurrect YES comes almost a full year after Hurricane Agnes achieved its infamy as the cause of the worst flood in the history of upstate New York.

Last year YES provided summer employment for more than 300 area high school and college students. They cleaned homes, repaired appliances, and in general made order out of disorder.
