


The Aquinas Marching Band and Color Guard captured six out of a possible ten first place awards in competition against 42 other bands from New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey at the Sherburne Pageant of Bands June 2 in Sherburne, N.Y.

First place was taken in the color guard competition in which Steve Magee was presented the Best Captain Award. The 92member band also placed first in the parade and field show competition and third place in the concert competition.

Points totaled from the various competition categories enabled the band, supported by the majorettes from Nazareth Academy, to win the Albert Whitney Achievement Award for overall pageant performance.

Alfred M. Fabrizio, Jr., music director for the Aquinas Institute, received the Frank L. Miller Outstanding Director Award

Deaths D.C. Stoffel

Douglas C. Stoffel, a lifelong resident of Irondequoit-died June 4, 1973, at the age of 83.

Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated Friday at St. Cecilia's.

Mr. Stoffel was a retired captain of the New York Central police. In his 36 years with the railroad agency, which he joined in 1919, he was involved in the protection of visiting presidents ranging from Warren C. Harding to Dwight D. Eisenhower. He was a member of the Newport Yacht Club, the Rochester Police Veteran Association and the Irondequoit Historical Society. He lived at 54 Woodridge Court:

George C., Green of Seneca Parkway died June 7, 1973, at St. Mary's Hospital, at the age of 67.

The funeral was Saturday at Sacred Heart Cathedral. Father Thomas H. Green, SJ, stationed in the Philippines, came home during of his father's final illness and was principal concelebrant of the Mass of the Resurrection.

Mr. Green, an insurance agent for nearly 40 years, was a member of the American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters and a former officer of the Rochester unit. A graduate of Holy Cross, he was a longtime member of the Holy Cross Club of Rochester and the University Club. He was a founding member and former president of the Loyola Cuild of McQuaid Jesuit High School and served, also on the Bishop's Committee on Scouting.

Survivors include his widow, Marie; two sons, Father Thomas and George C. Green Jr.; a daughter, Mrs. John D. (Marie Joyce) James; and six grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Walter N: (Ida) Parkes, all of Rochester, and several nieces and nephews.
