My husband, thank heavens, is not employed by one of those giant corporations whose policy it is to have their employees traveling one week out of every month.

Most of the time he is home which is the way I like it. When on those infrequent occasions he must spend one or more nights away from us, I respond in the spirit of independence, self-sufficiency and fortitude that characterized our pioneer women. I call my mother.

Since my mother lives 130 miles away and has my father and a house to look after plus assorted interests of her own, she almost never comes.

I make my pitch anyway, pointing out that three young children are a great responsibility, they offer little company and that there are an assorted number of shoe sales (her weakness) currently taking place in our city.

I am shameless but to no avail. She is busy, she says. My fears are groundless. Why don't I go to the library, borrow some books and catch up on my reading?

I know very well my fears are groundless. That doesn't make them any easier to reconcile. And I've read everything in our library. Besides, how can I concentrate when I am constantly checking four doors and the basement windows?

I developed a fear of staying alone at night after seven years of living alone. It happened the night after the birth of our first baby. I was a mother and therefore responsible. Now I am a mother three times over and responsible to the point of insanity.

How do I get all three, eight and under, out of the house in an emergency? What do I do if two of them develop 105 temperatures at the same time? What will happen if someone looks in a window and I see a face?

Ridiculous? Of course. Nevertheless I tell my three they are sleeping downstairs for the duration. I pull out the hide-a-bed and set up a cot. Somehow we are all safer downstairs at the point of possible entry.

I take up my post on the couch in the family room, deliberating whether or not to leave my son's baseball bat on the floor beside me. I decide against it. I settle against the pillow waking 8 1/2 hours later, only somewhat disconcerted that I slept so soundly. Three days later my husband arrives home. We got along, I tell him bravely (the cots and bedding all put away) just fine.

His smile and shrug indicate "what else?" I try to remember where I left the baseball bat.

## Trust is a Duty, Pope Declares

Vatican City (RNS) — Pope Paul opened the 10th General Assembly of the Italian Bishops' Conference by referring to the many serious problems that confront the episcopacy today and by urging a continued "duty of trust permeated by the spirit of sacrifice."

Running through a list of challenges for bishops — pastoral councils, vocations; liturgical training, Catholic organizations, aid to workers and the poor,

problems of the press and the family — the Pope said the aggressive forces of secularization are slowing spiritual progress.

He noted that "the winds of social metamorphosis do not seem to be blowing in our favor," and said that even the "positive symptoms" of the modern world are causes for anxiety.

Pope Paul said "trust is recommended as an indispensable co-efficient of our

ministry. This is a duty of faith." Presiding at the concelebration of Mass in the Vatican's Sistine Chapel to open the bishops' conference, Pope Paul was assisted by nine cardinals, 10 archbishops and nine bishops who make up the permanent council of the Italian Episcopal Conference.

Attending the General Assembly were observers from bishops' conferences in Yugoslavia, France, Spain and Poland.
