



THE CHURCH 1973 Fr. Andrew Greeley

I first met Dan Berrigan in a summer of the late Fifties at Oxley, Ontario, on the shores of then unpolluted Lake Erie. We hit it off well almost immediately. Dan thought that sociology was important and I thought poetry was important.

In later years he came to Chicago twice to speak to the young people with whom I was working (a work which, it turned out, was a total waste of time) and he had me to LeMoyné College on a couple of occasions to give lectures. Both times I was struck by two phenomena: 1) Dan was a Jesuit in his fingertips and 2) the Jesuit community was slowly destroying his spirit by the hard time it was giving him.

In later years we drifted apart, at first because we were becoming involved in different things and then because I could not agree with the tactics that Dan and his brother and their followers were using to oppose the war. I thought then and I still think that such tactics were counterproductive.

As the Berrigan cult (which I always thought had little to do with the laughing poet who had charmed me on the shores of Lake Erie) developed into a substitute faith for most Catholic liberals, I became virtually the only non-right winger in the country with the temerity to criticize the cult. Such iconoclasm is hardly consonant with friendship, though I often thought that Dan might be almost as nauseated by the cult as I was.

The cult is over and the former idolaters are turning against him — an event that was as inevitable as the Chicago Cubs blowing their lead in the National League pennant race. Therefore, Dan is going to need friends whose respect and affection is motivated by something more than fashion. Let it be noted that I'm putting my name on the list.

New Yorker Magazine did more than anyone else to create the Berrigan cult. It is now in the process of destroying what it created, and at the same time callously injuring the man whom it used as an inkblot with which the cult was fabricated. In a recent issue it has an account of a speech by Dan at a college. The story is written in that deadpan, straight reportorial style at which the New Yorker is so good. The reporter is merely a dispassionate observer, recording facts and details and making no judgments of his own. Dan is made to look like a rude, egotistical, unpleasant boor.

Father Farrell Dies, V.P. at Villanova

Father William E. Farrell, OSA, vice president for public relations and development at Villanova University died Monday, July 30, at Fitzgerald-Mercy Hospital, Darby, Pa., after a brief illness. He was 49.

A native of Rochester, he graduated from Villanova as a lay student in 1945 with a degree in civil engineering. He was a member of the Navy's V-12 Program and entered the Navy as an ensign at graduation.

Following his separation from the service, Father Farrell worked as a civil engineer for several years. In 1950 he entered the Augustinian Order to study for the priesthood. He was ordained five years later in Washington, D.C.

Following graduate work at Catholic University, Father Farrell was assigned in 1956 to Villanova as an instructor in civil

I don't know what his mood was during his pilgrimage to give the address. Everyone who has been on the lecture circuit knows how bone tired one can get, how taut one's nerves can be, how weary one's spirit can become under the obligation of combining small talk with the role in which one has been cast.

It is possible that Dan was indeed exhausted and did behave rudely. (I remember walking off a lecture platform at a time when my talk had been preceded by three hours of air sickness and followed by some of the most vicious questions I have ever heard.) But why write the story? And why use the phony objectivism which does not place his mood in the context of what he has been through?

The answer is clear, I think: there was money to be made in creating the Berrigan cult and there is now money to be made in demolishing it.

The word is out on the Catholic "liberal" grapevine: "that's the way Dan is nowadays." I don't believe it. All our personalities are multi-faceted. If the aspect of Dan's personality manifested in the New Yorker hatchet job is frequently displayed these days, I would contend that he has been driven to it by those fake liberals who created the cult to meet their own emotional needs, imprisoned Dan in it, and now are destroying it. Too bad he didn't stay away from them in the first place.

But all one needs to do to discover other aspects of the Berrigan personality is to read his forthcoming Prison Poems. There are indeed some terribly harsh — and I think Unchristian — poems about prison officials. But there also is an incredibly beautiful poem about his father's death which I am sure will become one of the classics of American literature. Its story of growing up in Minnesota will be read long after the political conflicts of our time are forgotten.

For most people it would be patronizing to say that Dan is a far better poet than he is a politician. But since I think poetry is far more important than politics (and would trade all my writing in for one poem which would move men and women to sing and dance) I can say in good conscience that Dan Berrigan's poetry makes him one of the great men of our time — and to hell with the New Yorker.
