

Pope Recommends Some Latin in Mass

Pope Paul has recommended a return to traditional Latin chants as part of the Mass.

The Pope told a Castel Gandolfo audience that "many have asked that in all nations the Latin and Gregorian chants of the Gloria, the Credo, the Sanctus, and Agnus Dei be preserved."

"God grant that it be so," the Pope added.

Probe Asked By 'Life' Group

Rep. Frank Horton of Rochester was the recipient of 40,000 to 45,000 signatures at his Federal Building office on Friday, Aug. 24.

The signatures were attached to a petition presented by the Rochester Area Right to Life Committee, requesting Rep. Horton's support of a constitutional amendment extending protection to "all human beings including innocent unborn infants."

The pro-life group also asked for an immediate congressional inquiry into why the federal government spent \$11,390 for a Health, Education, and Welfare Dept. program studying pro-life Catholics in New York State and various New York right-to-life organizations.

A one-year grant was given by HEW to Dr. J. Mayone Stycos, director of the International Population Program of Cornell University and Ph.D. candidate Frank Traina, to study Catholic mobilization against legalized abortion in the state.

The petition was also recently presented to Rep. Barber Conable. Signatures have been compiled since Easter, which was designated Right to Life Sunday.

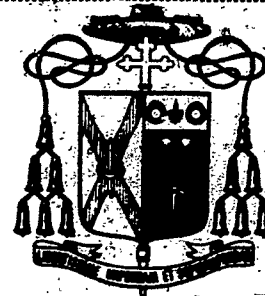
with the petition, stated that the Supreme Court, in its pro-abortion decision, chose to prefer the "social goal" rather than "human life."
