

Father Doran Dead at 86

Father William A. Doran, pastor emeritus of St. Anne's Church in Palmyra, died Aug. 22, 1973, at St. Ann's Home. He was 86 years old.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan concelebrated the Mass of the Resurrection last Saturday in the Palmyra church with Father William H. Hickey, pastor, and others. The homily was given by Father Doran's classmate, Msgr. John M. Ball, who is the only surviving member of the St. Bernard's Seminary class of 1915. At the Mass of the High Priest on Friday night, Auxiliary Bishop Dennis W. Hickey was principal concelebrant.

Burial was in the family plot in St. Columbkille Cemetery, Seneca Falls.

Father Doran was pastor of St. Anne's from 1939 until his retirement in 1959, and continued to live there until a few years ago. He had been pastor of St. Charles Borromeo, Rochester, 1929-1939, and earlier served at Holy Family, Auburn; St. Mary's, Bath, and Holy Redeemer, Rochester. He also had been chaplain at St. Mary's Hospital in Rochester and of St. Joseph's Hospital in Elmira.

Arthur Edward Brooks of Lima died Aug. 21, 1973, at the age of 57.

Bishop Joseph L. Hogan and Father Michael Hogan, his brothers-in-law, concelebrated the Mass of the Resurrection last Friday in St. Rose Church.

Mr. Brooks was a Kodak laboratory technician for 23 years and a former village trustee in Lima. Illness forced his retirement several years ago. He was a member of the Holy Name Society at St. Rose.

He is survived by his widow, Gertrude Hogan Brooks; a daughter, Mrs. Lawrence Lanphere of Lima; a son, John, of Livonia; a sister, Mrs. Clarence Page of Williamson; six grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Maude Fitzgerald

Mass of the Resurrection was celebrated last Wednesday at St. Augustine's for Maudé Hayes Fitzgerald, who died Aug. 19, 1973.

Mrs. Fitzgerald, formerly of Kenwood Avenue, was a member of the St. Augustine Rosary Society. She leaves three daughters, Mrs. Harold (Emma) Lortz, Mrs. Fred (Evelyn) Dittman and Mrs. Arthur (Bernice) Hoelscher; two sons, Richard and Bernard Fitzgerald; a sister, Mrs. George (Pearl) Haering; a brother, Basil B. Hayes; 15 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

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He was born June 20, 1887, in Rush and attended public school in Henrietta before entering the diocesan seminaries. He was ordained June 12, 1915, in old St. Patrick's Cathedral by Archbishop Thomas F. Hickey.

Two sisters survive him — Mrs. Fred Reidal of Rochester and Sister M. Esther Doran, SSJ, who lives at the Motherhouse.

Boston to Move Gradually on First Penance

Boston [RNS] — The Roman Catholic archdiocese here has issued new guidelines concerning the reception by children of First Penance and First Communion, but has authorized a gradual transition from the experimental practice of delayed First Confession.

In response to a recent Vatican directive curtailing the experimental program being carried on in the U.S., the guidelines revert to the former practice of placing preparation for First Penance ahead of preparation for First Communion.

However, noting that "an orderly transition from the experimental practice . . . is desired," the guidelines say some catechetical programs may have progressed to such a point where "great confusion would result from . . . a sudden change." Therefore:

"When, in the judgment of priests and religious educators in the parish, such is the case, these (experimental) programs may be completed." The guidelines said the transition should be completed by the end of the 1973-74 school year.

Approved by Cardinal Humberto Medeiros, the guidelines were issued by Father John R. Mulvihill, director of the archdiocesan office for religious education.

Council Anniversary Noted

Geneva [RNS] — Congratulations to the World Council of Churches on its 25th anniversary were received here at the organization's Central Committee meeting from Pope Paul VI and Orthodox Patriarch Dimitrios of Istanbul.

The Roman Catholic pontiff recalled his historic visit to the Ecumenical Center here in 1969 and reiterated his expression at that time of appreciation for the development of WCC-Catholic relations. "It is our sincere desire," he said, "that this collaboration may be pursued and intensified, according to the spirit of the Second Vatican Council.

"These years have been rich in activities and events," Pope Paul said, "and the present celebration is surely more than a commemoration of past history. The World Council of Churches has been created in order, by the grace of God, to serve the Churches and ecclesial communities in their endeavors to restore and to manifest to all that perfect communion in faith and love which is the gift of Christ to his Church."

Patriarch Dimitrios cited his "deep satisfaction" for the "positive and true achievements in the joint efforts within the Council for witness and service to man, the contemporary society and the world which is being tried in many ways." The Orthodox leader also expressed hope that the WCC will continue "to serve and to comfort the suffering contemporary man in distress, in assisting Churches on the one hand and, on the other hand, in promoting the high aim of

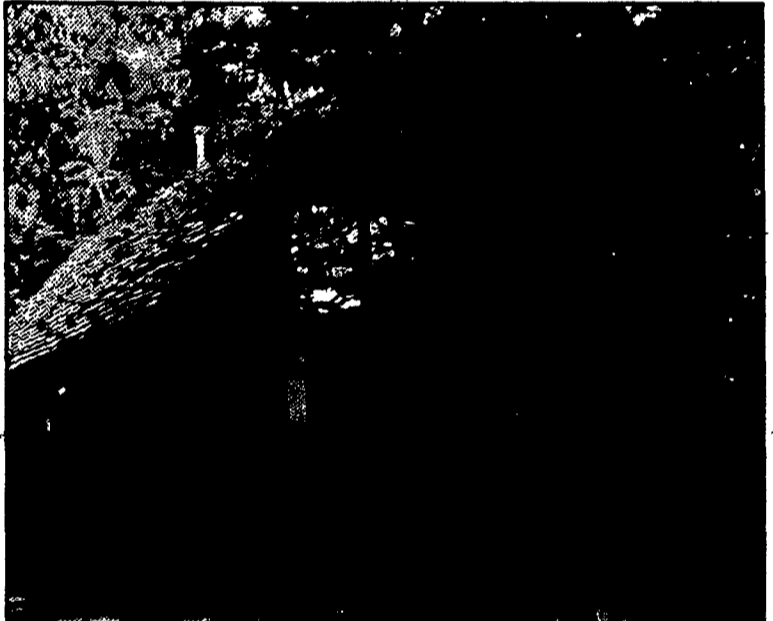
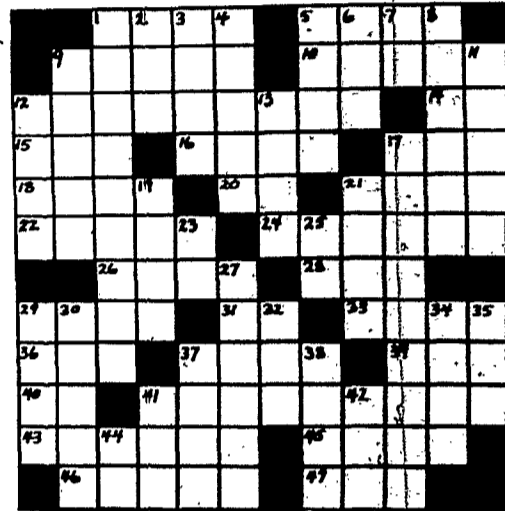

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


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
