



ON THE RIGHT SIDE

Many good things have come from Vatican II. For example, there is the Mass in the vernacular which gives homogeneous congregations a more direct sharing in the Mass; authentic ecumenism in which we share with our separated brothers, not only social services, but mutual prayer, and especially scholarship. Many of us will always be grateful to Bishop Fulton J. Sheen for recommending Barclay's Daily Bible Studies. Dr. Barclay is a Church of Scotland scripture scholar. His volumes have an occasional lapse into obvious heresy, e.g. his views on the Virgin Birth. Nevertheless his books are rich in explanation of the New Testament.

But many bad things have come from perverting Vatican II documents. For example there is a false concept of freedom and liberty, and a weird, unChristlike personalism. Another example is the practical abandonment of the Latin Mass which gave worshipers a universal language for multi-language congregations.

I remember how strikingly this was brought out in St. Peter's, Rome. The Pope celebrated the Mass for a universal congregation of Spanish, Hungarians, Germans, Americans, Orientals, Africans, Italians, Swedes, etc. Do you know what language was used in the Mass? Italian! I was there. The year was 1965. And to this day I cannot figure out why Italian should have been used for us who were bursting to recite the Gloria and Creed, the Kyrie and Sanctus and Agnus Dei with our co-religionists. We all knew these prayers in Latin.

One of the worst effects of misconstruing Vatican II, through elite liturgical groups, has been the burial of books of devotion, or prayer books. For centuries bishops have recommended prayer books which express beautifully and devoutly sentiments which we often are not able to express in our own words. With blithe inconsistency, those who scoffed, with nose tilting superciliousness, at "reading your prayers" have been great enthusiasts for reading the psalms as prayers.

We ask: is there some difference between reading the prayer-psalms and reading with the heart, prayers which the Saints and generations of prayerful Christians have found spiritually profitable?

These twisters have been very successful. They have discouraged people from using prayer books, with a resultant decline of devout prayer life. They have succeeded in the discontinuing of publication of prayer books, like the Manual of Prayers.

They have been so insidious that they have persuaded too many priests and nuns to stop reading the Divine Office, which is the official prayer of the Church recited for the people; and the people are defrauded of great floods of holy prayer which should be rising before the throne of God.

Sometimes after the Communion of the Mass I recite some of the prayers the people knew from their prayer books, such as the prayer before the crucifix, the Anima Christi, and O Sacred Banquet. Frequently people will come to the sacristy and say: "O Father, that prayer was beautiful. Can you get me a copy?" I am always glad to give them one because such persons have been robbed of much of the devotional treasures of the Church, and they are rediscovering the treasury.

And when you pray, please pray for your priests and Sisters; pray for Catholics who are weak in the Faith; and for non-Catholics, that they may come to the Faith; and for youngsters, who are the Church of tomorrow. St. Gregory wrote: "Prayer is as necessary to the soul as water is to a fish." So, let us pray!

The annual Jerry Lewis Telethon for the benefit of the Muscular Dystrophy Associations of America will be seen this year on 155 television stations across the country.

The Labor Day telethon will start at 10:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 2, and will close at 6:30 p.m. the following day. It will be seen here on WHEC-TV, Channel 10.

Last year Jerry Lewis and crew raised \$9.3 million to provide equipment and services for 250,000 patients in 125 clinics throughout the United States and

to finance research in 50 medical centers throughout the world. This year the telethon has set a goal of more than \$10 million.

Among the stars lined up for entertainment are Johnny Carson, John Lennon and Yoko Ono, Julie Budd, John Davidson, Joan Crawford, Gina Lollobrigida, Sammy Davis Jr., Peter Falk, James Franciscus, David Hartman, Richie Havens, Werner Klemperer, the Lettermen, Rowan and Martin, Helen Reddy, Don Ho, Alan King, Don Rickles, Leslie Uggams, Jerry Vale, Karen Valentine, Dionne Warwick, and Joe Namath.

The telethon will originate from the Sahara Hotel in Las Vegas. There will be cut-ins from New York City where excerpts from current Broadway and night club hits will be shown live.

From Nashville, Johnny Cash will perform, along with Roy Clark, Sonny James, the Compton Brothers, Danny Davis and the Nashville Brass, Tommy Overstreet, and Billy Walker.

Locally, WHEC and Eddie Meath will host the telethon for 10 minutes every hour, presenting local personalities in appeal for funds, and announcing the local totals.
