Q. Didn't you make a retreat recently under Cardinal John Wright?

A. Yes. At Saint Peter's Seminary, London, Ont., Aug. 27-31. Redemptorist Father Russell Conway was helping out at St. Alphonsus, Auburn. He told Father Robert Kress the cardinal was giving the London retreat; so we signed up, the only Americans there.

Q. What were the Canadian priests like?

A. The 97 retreatant group was more cosmopolitan than our own diocesan make up. Besides the Canadians of Irish, French, German and Italian ancestry, there were several immigrants from Poland, Lithuania and Czechoslovakia, including two former inmates of Dachau. Of the 270 diocesan priests in London Diocese, only 25 younger priests do parish work. There is a heavy load of younger priests in non-pastoral work. London had no ordinations these past two years, but vocations are now on the upswing. I was well impressed by the good balance of the 53-year-old seminary rector, Father Carrigan, and his seminary program.

Q. What were the priests like?

A. The pastors struck me as dedicated, serious, hard-working plough-horse priests. I mean this in the most laudatory sense. Their conversations evidenced their devotion to the Church and to their people. I haven't witnessed so much beautiful, simple prayerfulness in years, including the private stations of the cross, the rosary, and private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament. And after the Wednesday night penitential rite, the priests lined up for confession just like people used to at missions. I wish our bewildered people could have seen this great appreciation of confession in their priests. And the young priests! They were

a delight: cheerful, self-disciplined, zealous. Grand men.

Q. What of the conferences?

A. Long, gripping, and full of anecdotal illustrations. Any man who is a friend of the mighty, or who has had dealings with them, as well as with the ordinary people, has a wealth of practical experience. Three popes, hundreds of churchmen, intellectuals, politicians, and the ordinary people, good and bad have given him insights not given to many. Santayana, deChardin, whose sister was his parishioner and friend in France, the Kennedys, Maritain, the Reddingtons; envoys, ambassadors, hippies, beloved relatives and such like have enriched his brilliant mind.

Q. Was there any reference to the Sept. 3 article on first confession in Time?

A. Yes. At an evening colloquium he was asked about the article. He shrugged his arthritic shoulders and said: "Time describes me as the architect of the decree to return to the traditional practice of First Confession. The truth is that the decree was the work of two congregations: the Congregation on the Sacraments, and the Congregation for the Clergy. The pope signed it himself; and so did I. And I was glad to. But the truth is that the decree was the result of the work of the two congregations over a period of two years." In a private conversation later he mentioned that he had visited the Fathers John and Tom Reddington the previous week; had given the homily at Holy Name Parish Mass; and had a "delightful, relaxing supper with Bishop Hogan" whom he described as a "fine man." The Time article implied some animus between the two churchmen, which report is about as crooked as the rest of the article.

Q. Any special quote from the Retreat?

A. Yes. "Pope Paul asked the philosopher Jacques Guiton: 'What do the laity want of their priests?' Guiton replied: 'I fear for the priests of the future. In a noble wish to mix with us, they are in danger of becoming like us, even to using our patois. They are in danger of not being sufficiently conscious of their priesthood. What we laity ask is that which no state or university or society can give. Give us God. Give us absolution. Give us consecration.' I think when this notion of the priesthood takes hold of our generous young people, we will have lots of vocations.
