Sacred Heart Parish Offers Adult Courses

Sacred Heart Parish has developed a program for continuing education which is open to adult parishioners and non-parishioners.

The courses will be offered on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings from 8 to 10 p.m., and will give the Eucharist in the sessions starting Sept. 25 and 26 which will meet in the parish hall.

The Family Service Association of Rochester, an educational, counseling and training agency will make use of lecture, demonstration, role-playing, skits and discussion in its course, Family Communication: Where It's At, Where It Can Be. This course will be taught Tuesday night, beginning Sept. 25. On Wednesday evening Sept. 26, Sister Mary Lourdes, SSJ, who teaches theology at Nazareth College, will offer Contemporary Catholicism — Understanding the Church of Today, in which such topics as ecumenism, penance, liturgy and Eucharist, laity, clergy and parish councils will be considered.

Conference Set On Reading

Dr. Roselmina Indrisano, coordinator of the Master of Education Program for graduates of Liberal Arts Colleges and president-elect of the New England Reading Association, will be among the nationally-known reading experts who will address the Rochester International Reading Association's Fall Conference, Saturday, Sept. 22 from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Spencerport's Wilson High School.

Three major addresses and 18 seminars will focus on the theme Pupil Power through Reading. The conference is open to teachers and the general public.

The three major speakers, will be Dr. Joseph Nemeth, chairman of the Department of Reading in the School of Education at Bowling Green State University, Ohio; Dr. Cecilia Pollack, director of Special Education at Lehman College in the Bronx and director of the Intersensory Reading Center; and Dr. Indrisano.

Other speakers include Dr. Vincent Faraone, director of Reading, Islip Public Schools on Long Island and a professor at Hofstra University; Jerry Hutchins, associated with the State Education Department in the area of providing management and consultant services to state decentralized school districts; Olga Vaughn, consultant for the Bureau of Reading for Title I Programs in New York State; and Mrs. Joyce Cejka, field consultant in Teaching Resources for the New York Times.
