To an Irate Critic:

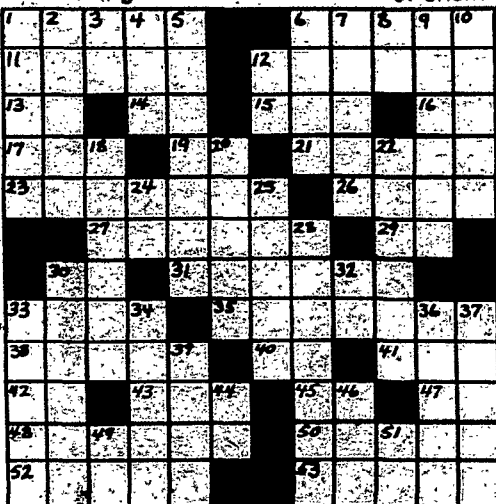

"If you consider children truly educated in the Catholic faith and practices by depriving them of the rosary, the Angelus, visits to the Blessed Sacrament, tenderness to Our Lady; and if you consider a pail of sociological humanism the substitute for a bucket of Christian charity, of course you will hate the Pontifical Centers. But if you were a pastor or a Sister or an anxious parent, you would be glad with me. Our Sunday Visitor (Sept. 16, 1973) comments: "To make certain the professionals are trained in orthodoxy I suggest bishops and pastors write to the above-mentioned Pontifical Centers to enroll students for the next session. Last year most of the students at the Gannon College Center were sent by their Bishops or by their diocesan directors. So, things are looking up, to the Blessed Trinity."

To Sister Mary St. Owen, BVM, of Dubuque.

"I am glad our radio program, Magnify the Lord, pleases so many of you in Dubuque. It would be good if you could interest your friends in the program; and ask them either to phone the radio station or to write to the manager; and let them know you appreciate their own part in promoting the praises of God and Our Lady.
